WELCOME HOME FOR SOLDIERS FROM SIBERIA

Some seventeen members of the Siberian Expeditionary force arrived in the city this morning on the Montreal train, and met with a hearty greeting. Lieut. Col. A. H. Powell who had been in command, did not return to St. John today but will arrive tomorrow. The others here later in the week. Representatives of the Citizens' Committee and K. of C. were on hand to welcome the returning soldiers who were under Capt. E. C. Banks of Winnipeg as conducting officer. The men looked very fit and expressed themselves as happy to be back again. Some of them had gotten into Siberia by way of Vladivostok. The names of those returning today are: Privates J. L. Among those returning with the members of the Siberian soldiers' party today was Pte. Fred W. Simonds, son of W. Simonds, Water street merchant. He has been away about two years and was warmly welcomed. His homecoming was a welcome surprise, as he was not looked for until tonight.

FORMER ST. JOHN BOY HERE WITH LABRADOR EXPEDITION

Joseph P. Halpin, a former St. John boy, who has been in the United States for some years, is in the city making preparations for an expedition to Labrador, which is to be commanded by Captain Dan O'Brien, for the purpose of taking forest surveys in the interest of a United States lumber firm.

Mr. Halpin is an expert electrician and was employed with the Edison Electrical Company for several years. He was also a member of the British Air Force and will assist Captain Owen in taking the desired photographs of the forests from an aeroplane. He is also to be in charge of the installation of wireless equipment on the steamer Greenpeace, which is chartered to carry the party of twenty-two from St. John to St. Anthony, Newfoundland, and thence to their destination.

When you decide upon the place and date, I will be obliged if you will include it in the "Movements in the Daily Telegraph," the Transcript of Movements in the Province, which advertisements will contain the place and date of the convention for all of the constituent associations in the province. I would also suggest that this will be inserted in local newspapers in your constituency to give it the desired publicity.

Before your convention assemblies, I will be in a position to advise you of the names of the twelve delegates who are chosen by the provincial committees, members and defeated candidates, so that some of them may be elected by your convention.

Under the organization of the national convention, as adopted by the Liberal parliamentary committee, in addition to the elected delegates, all the federal members and defeated candidates are entitled to attend, as well as the provincial presidents of the Liberal associations.

The Ottawa convention in its formal organization will include only authorized delegates, but any Liberal who desires to attend the convention in an unofficial capacity will be most heartily welcomed. I trust a representative delegation from your constituency will attend.
