T. H. BULLOCK AND E. J. HILYARD ARE ELECTED

With a total vote of about 5,000 polled, T. H. Bullock and Edwin J. Hilyard were elected city commissioners in the final yesterday. T. H. Bullock led the poll with a total of 2,855 votes, while E. J. Hilyard was second with a total of 2,622. The vote was relatively small while the margin between the winners was not great. John Thornton took third place with a total of 2,400, being beaten out by E. J. Hilyard by 122 votes. Something of a surprise was sprung in the vote polled by James H. Frink, which totalled 2,306, making him low man in the contest.

The vote for commissioner polled in the 1916 final was as follows: Fisher, 4,187; Sharpe, 3,322; McLellan, 4,127; Segure, 2,185. The totals as shown by the records in the 1914 elections, when three commissioners were elected, were: Agar, 3,003; Fisher, 2,915; Russell, 3,869; Wigmore, 5,268; Potts, 5,088; and DeForest, 5,114.

ZEPPELIN HANGAR DAMAGED BY FIRE

Amsterdam, April 21.—A fire on April 13 at Friedrichshafen involved an old Zeppelin hangar and was quickly subdued, according to an official statement issued in Berlin. The damage was slight and work in the Zeppelin yards was not hampered.

A despatch from Geneva on April 16 reported that enormous loss was caused by a fire on the preceding Saturday in the Zeppelin works at Hangel, near Friedrichshafen. The plant was destroyed and vast quantities of raw material were burned. Two large Zeppelins and forty airplanes were also lost. The number of victims was said to be considerable.

PLANT AND PRODUCE

(Toronto Star)
Prof. Schurman, president of Cornell University, makes the statement that in his belief we will be face to face with world famine this year. Probably no one is in a better position than he to calculate the effect of the withdrawal of so many millions of men from agriculture. Therefore what he says should be seriously considered by everyone.

Undoubtedly food will be in sore need this fall. Until a short time ago restriction on meat consumption in this country was considered a remote possibility, and as for restrictions on wheat flour, that was looked on, if it had been at all, as a chimera in this land of great wheat crops. Now we hear urgent appeals from the food controllers in England, the United States and Canada to save both meat and bread.

It is most probable that further and drastic restrictions will be placed on the consumption of food this year, and it therefore becomes necessary for all to give serious thought as to how they can produce food products.

The farmers are doing their utmost with the limited labor available to make the farms produce as much as possible; the backyard and town lot gardeners are well organized, but business and professional men in cities, towns, and villages might possibly more, by helping direct and finance specific efforts at production.

Any staple food that has keeping qualities is desirable. Probably the best is beans. The bean combines the qualities of meat and vegetables. It is 24 per cent protein, or higher in that essential quality than beef, will not freeze as well as potatoes and other vegetables. It will not sprout, as will onions, and it will not rot. If kept dry it will keep for a year or more. The price of beans will remain high as long as prices of meats are high, for it is the best substitute for meats. Beans can always be exchanged for other foods.

Many business and professional men could very well start to do some planting either personally or by proxy.

Ship Searched for Liquor

Halifax, April 22.—The French steamer Pro Patria, from St. Pierre Miquelon, lying at a wharf in the harbor, was searched by the City Temperance act-inspector for liquor, on Friday night, but none was found. The ship's stores were, as usual on arrival in port, under seal of the customs.

Now the attention of the French consul, here, has been called to the matter and the legality of searching of foreign owned ships after they have complied with the customs department regulations under the eye of an officer of that department may be tested.

The object will doubtless be to reduce our imports from the United States, with a view to conserving our financial resources for war objects and to placing exchange conditions on a more satisfactory basis. Some lines of business may by this action be temporarily dislocated, but the capital stock therein might be diverted to other forms of enterprise with advantage. The premium on New York funds indicates the continued existence of a considerable adverse balance of trade, which is partially created by the importation of non-essential articles, and co-operation with the departments of the government established for that purpose, but it is quite obvious that the general public is not depriving itself of its usual comforts and luxuries despite the continuously advancing prices of all necessities. The abundance of employment at high and advancing wages, due to war conditions, is sustaining the present apparent prosperity, which, as might be expected, is not accompanied by evidences of personal sacrifice and frugality. Our railroad, financial and industrial organizations are working at very high pressure, and on the whole have since the outbreak of war, developed greater efficiency. The output of our industries continues to increase, and more orders are being placed here by the government of the United States. It remains highly desirable, however, that the production of the war should not be hampered by lack of labor and should have the sympathetic co-operation of government agencies. The producers and importers of commodities not of this class may, however, reasonably expect their operations curtailed, and any effort to this end on the part of the War Trade Board will be welcomed by all who realize the seriousness of the outlook.
