**COST OF LIVING**  
**IN A NEW RECORD**  
**IN COMING WINTER**

**Provisions of All Kinds Are Re-**  
**ported to Be Soaring in Mon-**  
**tréal**

Montreal, Oct. 23.—The constantly in-  
creasing cost of living is causing much  
concern in the majority of the households  
in Montreal, and many a housewife has  
to puzzle her head as to how to make a  
dollar do what seventy-five cents used to  
accomplish easily.

The big jump which has been taken in  
the price of eggs, with further advances  
threatened, has already been noted. Cool  
milk, which but a short time ago was  
6 cents a quart, has this month been ad-  
vanced to ten cents, and cream to 25  
cents a pint. Butter is correspondingly  
dear, and the dealers are beginning  
to prophesy a shortage in potatoes,  
owing to the bad fall weather, which may  
again carry those necessary articles of  
diet into the class of eggs.

As happened last winter, this winter,  
if such a shortage occurs, it will be  
aggravated by the fact that the govern-  
ment has prohibited the import of po-  
tatoes from Europe, for fear of the Euro-  
pean potato disease being spread here.

And meat—well look at what you have  
to pay for meat these days. And on the  
top of it all there is the rent—which has  
increased enormously.

**Lowering Standard of Living**  
Country people, who can raise most of  
their vegetables, eggs, poultry, etc., and  
whose rent—when they do not own their  
own place—is small and stationary, have  
no idea of the hardships which the rapid  
increase in the cost of living imposes on  
the working classes of a big city like  
Montreal. It is lack of much of the mis-  
ery and privation which conditions exposed  
at the Child Welfare Exhibition, for in  
many cases, the increase in the cost of  
living is not accompanied by a correspond-  
ing increase in wages, and the lowering  
of the standard of living is the result.

This high cost of living, however, is  
not peculiar to Montreal. It is being ex-  
perienced all over the continent. In the  
United States the fluctuations have been  
slightly more extreme than in Canada, but  
the trend in general has been very nearly  
parallel in the two countries for the past  
twenty years.

At the same time, some remarkable dif-  
ferences in the prices are shown by a  
comparison between different cities. For  
instance, when in January, 1911, the mar-  
ket price of new-laid eggs in Montreal  
was from 20 to 25 cents a dozen, in Bos-  
ton, and in Buffalo, for 38 cents. And  
even now the prices are so much more  
favorable in Montreal that egg-raters in  
Ontario, who live comparatively close to  
Toronto, send their eggs to Montreal by  
preference. Eggs are now up from five  
to ten cents a dozen compared with what  
they were two or three years ago.

**Butter Higher Than in Winter**  
Butter is already up this year to con-  
siderably higher than the usual mid-win-  
ter price, although the present season has  
been one of the most favorable for dairy-  
ing in many years. At the end of Febru-

ary, in 1911, the wholesale price of the  
best creamery solids only reached 25 1/2  
cents per pound, while the average Octo-  
ber price for the past five years has been  
24 cents. Now 20 to 30 cents is the mar-  
ket price. At this rate, all butter will  
be 10 cents dearer this winter than usual.  
All kinds of meat show a corresponding  
tendency to increase this year. Three or  
four years ago, for instance, choice hogs  
were down to around 85 per cent. Now  
they are up in price by at least one-third.  
Breakfast bacon only four years ago was  
from 15 to 16 cents per pound; at the  
present time it is fetching 18 cents.

Choice steers are now bringing \$9 to  
\$10 per cwt., as against \$4.50 to \$4.75  
five years ago, while sheep and lambs  
have advanced at least one-fourth in  
price, in the same time.

What is the reason for this general ad-  
vance in prices, and who is reaping the  
benefit of them? These questions will be  
dealt with in subsequent articles to ap-  
pear in the "Witness" dealing with the  
high cost of living.
