Stovall's Case.

George Stovall, deposed as manager of the St. Louis American League team and definitely suspended as a player by Ban D. Johnson, president of the league, as a result of Stovall's attack on Umpire Ferguson, may get permission to play again this season and also may be reinstated in his managerial berth, according to Mr. Johnson.
"The case is not closed," said Mr. Johnson, "Stovall is relieved as manager indefinitely and is suspended indefinitely from playing. If he is allowed to play his position again, it does not follow that he will assume the management of the team."
The order was issued by Johnson as his personal edict.
"I cannot recall any precedent for this step," said Mr. Johnson, "I did this myself, according to the powers given me by the league constitution and without any hesitation."
Mr. Johnson expressed indignation at Stovall's attack and intimated that more punishment might be in store for the St. Louis player. "There is not room in the American League for players who commit offenses against public decency," he declared. "It is anticipated that any manager should create such a scene by losing his self-control in the presence of a large assembly of patrons of his game. The American league will not countenance such conduct for a minute."
Stovall was ordered out by Ferguson in the sixth inning of the game in St. Louis on Saturday, with the Cleveland team. In a rage at the order Stovall is said to have pulled Ferguson's cap from his head and spat on the umpire's coat.
Diamond Sparkles.
Taylor, the pitcher obtained by Montreal from the Philadelphia Nationals, and Savage, an infielder, have been sent to the Utica Club of the New York State League.
Manager Jennings has added another Frenchman to his Tigers in the person of Catcher Russell Breaux, a student at the University of Louisiana, who will report at the close of the college year.
Walter, a New York outfielder, owes his stay in the major league to George Stallings. He was a left-handed pitcher when Stallings secured him from the Boston Americans for the New York Highlanders and made an outfielder of him.
Playing for Hartford on Sunday against Waterbury, P. J. Duggan, last year's Frederick team, made a great fielding record.

Big Intercollegiate Meet.
Chicago, May 8.—Intercollegiate athletic meet will be held on the lake front on July 1 and 2, under the auspices of the International Athletic Championships Association. C. E. The meet will be the first of its kind and the largest ever held.
