CIRCUS A GOOD ONE

Howe's Shows Draw Thousands
and Tents Filled at Both Per-
formancesThere is always something about a
circus which seems to appeal to young
and old, to fascinate them almost for the
time being, causing young hearts to flutter
lighter than ever, and the older ones to
experience thrills of excitement and
anticipation which serve to drive away
dull care and make them wish they were
young again. Yesterday was Circus
Day in St. John, with the visit of Howe's
Great London Shows. The grounds in
Frederick street were thronged all day
long and visitors were well repaid.The centre of chief interest was the
main tent where there was seating ac-
commodation for 10,000 people, but this
was taxed to its utmost at both matinee
and evening performances. The various
side-shows also attracted many.The "big show" consisted of two good-
sized sawdust rings and a platform, with
all accoutrements and in these an excel-
lent programme was given. There were
some acts which alone more prominent-
ly than others, and of these might be
mentioned the troupe of Japanese acrobats,
contortionists, wire-walkers, and
general platform performers. They won
hearty applause for their acts. The
equestrianism of some of the artists in
the rings was most commendable and
the various feats by back-bend riders
were thrilling and pleasing. Professor
Duckell's act with his coal-black steeds
was warmly received. One of the most
daring acts of the programme in the
ring was that wherein Professor Duckell
and a clever horsewoman capered from
a wagonette to the backs of two horses
as freely and easily as if they were in
a street car.The acrobatic acts of the athletes, the
Vivians, a trio of girls with wonderful
powers of tenacity in their jaws, swing-
ing and twisting and executing petty
dances in the air, and the funny op-
erics of the squad of clowns, all came in
for their share of attention and ap-
plause.Altogether it was a very creditable
show. As compared with others Howe's
is a real show. It has been seen here, but there
have been larger shows which
did not present so entertaining a pro-
gramme, and in such a de-
lightfully clean and wholesome manner.
In the menagerie the animals created in-
terest. A pair of tiny leopard cubs
gambolling freely about their "ma" in a
glass front cage caused many to stand
for some time and admire them. Late
last night the shows moved on to Mc-
Adam and after that to Montreal.

COMMON COUNCIL MATTERS

At the meeting of the common coun-
cil yesterday afternoon it was decided
to call for tenders for the reconstruction
of the wharf adjoining the east side
ferry boats, on the St. John wharf. Com-
missioner Schofield said that it was im-
portant that the work should be pro-
ceeded with this summer, as the wharf
tenders would in no way bind the com-
missioners to carry on the work.The recommendation of the com-
missioner of finance that Venerable Arch-
deacon Raymond and Mrs. Josephine
Robertson be appointed to the position of
members of the free public library com-
mission was carried.It was decided to renew the retaining
wall in front of the David Lynch prop-
erty in Acadia street at a cost of \$175.
The St. John Railway Co. was given
the right to erect a street lamp on a
pole in Crown street between King and
Leinster. The St. John Amusement Co.
was granted permission to lay pipes
across the south side of King Square to
aid in their lighting system. The
Knights of Pythias were granted per-
mission to erect an electric sign in Ger-
