**Can You Laugh?**

Can you laugh? Just about once in so often I am newly impressed with the enormous value of a good laugh as a social asset.

My most recent lesson in this matter was given me by one of those mushroom acquaintances which we all make in vacation days. She was a rather plain woman with no particular recommendation, except that ability to laugh, often, at the proper time, and extremely well. And by "well" I don't mean merrily, but simply with an appearance of hearty enjoyment and appreciation. Without the laugh she would have been commonplace. With it she shortly became one of the most popular women in the hotel. Every one said to everyone else, "What a jolly woman Mrs. S. is. How much interest she takes in everyone. What a pleasure it is to talk to her." Newcomers, especially, were delighted with her.

At first I, too, was among the enthusiasts, but in two or three weeks I—like many others—got under the laugh, found that the heartiness was only a mask, and that the reality beneath the mask was rather more cold and selfish than the average. But whoever failed her, there were always plenty of new arrivals to meet the lady, fall beneath the spell of the laugh and go about saying, "What a jolly woman Mrs. S. is, etc."

Now please consider what an asset that laugh was. It successfully concealed coldness and self-interest; it won constant popularity for an otherwise commonplace woman; it made infinitely more friends for her in a season than many grudgingly cordial men and women find in a lifetime.

Now I am sure some of my readers are wondering what I mean by praising such a woman. Perhaps they are saying, "I wouldn't be such a hypocrite for anything."

Nobody wants you to be hypocrites, my friends. And I am not praising the woman. I am simply praising the laugh. If I am taking it for granted that you are one of the grudgingly cordial folk, and, therefore, I urge that you learn to laugh as a self-expression, not as a pretense.

If a woman with no warmth in her heart could make friends so easily by a pleasant laugh, think how much a man or woman with a really cordial heart could do.

An attractive show window is necessary to lure people into a shop even if the things inside are most desirable. And so even the most desirable people cannot afford to be entirely without show-window characteristics such as good manners, the ability to talk small talk, an agreeable presence and a pleasant laugh. A pleasant smile is a good thing, but a pleasant laugh is infinitely better. So don't be afraid to laugh, both with people and with them—when they want to be laughed at. And don't think such a time doesn't exist. Most people are as avid to be laughed at as a cat is to have its back scratched; provided, of course, you laugh at them at the right time—that is, when they intend to be amusing. Can you laugh? If you can't why don't you learn to?

**Daily Hints For the Cook**

**GOOSEBERRY MARMALADE.**  
Cut all the ends off. Five pounds of berries take five pounds of sugar and one pint of water. Crush the fruit before putting it in the syrup and boil slowly an hour or longer. Gooseberries may be put up in cold water in jars and cooked when needed, the same as you do with cranberries. Gooseberry marmalade is perfectly delicious. I have also made some fine pineapple preserve and will give the rule: Peel the fruit and let it go through the meat chopper. To two cups of pulp take one cup of sugar. Cook fifteen minutes. Seal hot and keep in a dark place.

**MUSTARD PICKLE.**  
Three quarts of green tomatoes, one quart of onions, six green peppers, all cut up into small pieces. Sprinkle with one cup of salt, let stand over night or two or three hours in the morning. I fix all mine in the morning, then get out all the water, then add medium-sized cauliflower (boiled tender in very little water), cut into small pieces, one pound of brown sugar, six tablespoons of mustard, one tablespoon of turmeric powder (not any more) three pints of vinegar; boil fifteen minutes. Then add one cup of sifted flour in one pint of vinegar (making two quarts in all). Boil until it thickens.

**LA MARQUISE DE FONTENAY**

The Fortunes of Earl Ferrers—Related to George Washington—Famous Herd of Wild White Cattle Linked With Family History

Fortunately the new Earl Ferrers, eleventh of his line, although an architect by profession, is a very rich man, through his wife, the daughter and heiress of the late Robert Moon, and will therefore be able to restore in a measure the fortunes of his peerage, which has been so closely identified throughout English history with the maintenance and care of the famous herd of longhorned wild white cattle.

The family is one that has many American associations, and the new Lord Ferrers can boast of the same descent as the first president of the United States; for the first Earl Ferrers of the present family married Elizabeth, only child and heiress of Laurence Washington, the latter's elder brother, Robert Washington, was Lord of the Manor of Sulgrave, and ancestor of George Washington in the direct male line. A namesake of the new Lord Ferrers, and a member of the family of which he is now the chief, is that Walter Shirley who was a colonial governor of Massachusetts, and commander-in-chief of the British forces in America at the beginning of those troubles between the colonies and the mother country which culminated in the War of Independence.

The town of Shirley, near Groton, in Massachusetts, is named after him. The Ferrers peerage, and the Chartley Park property with the herd of wild cattle, came into the Shirley family through the marriage of Sir Henry Shirley to Lady Dorothy Devereaux, daughter of Queen Elizabeth's favorite Lord Essex, who was also Lord Ferrers. On Essex's death, his Barony of Ferrers fell into abeyance, in which it was recalled by Charles II. in favor of Sir Robert Shirley, grandson of Lady Dorothy Devereaux. Subsequently Charles II. advanced him to the dignities of Viscount Tamworth, and Earl Ferrers. It is unnecessary to recall here the description of the crime of the fourth earl, who after trial by his peers in the House of Lords in 1709, and sentence to death, wrote to the gallows at Tyburn, where the Marble Arch now stands, in London, in

his state coach-and-six, namely, the carriage gilted and painted, that was otherwise used at court functions at coronations, and for the opening of parliament.

It was at his execution that the drop was used for the first time in England, in the place of the old system of cart and ladder. The drop, it is reported, did not work very well. It is on record that the earl's toes touched the ground, and that he suffered a little, having time to raise the cap; but the executioner pulled it down again, and then pulled his legs so that he was soon out of pain, and quite dead in four minutes. After he had been left hanging for an hour he was buried in Old St. Pancras Churchyard, where twenty years later his remains were disinterred, and conveyed to the family mausoleum at Stanton Harold, near Ashby-de-la-Zouche, where they now repose.

This particular Earl was separated from his wife, and as she refused to hold any communication with him after his arrest and trial, he cured her on the scaffold, and predicted for her a terrible death by fire. After his death she married Lord Frederick Campbell, brother of the then Duke of Argyll, and lived for nearly fifty years subsequently. But she was always haunted by the terrible curse of her first husband, and her fears increased with age.

so much, so that she caused a suite of fireproof rooms to be specially prepared for her, at considerable expense, at her house of Coombe Bank.

Despite these precautions, she was burned to death in her bed for, having fallen asleep while reading, the flimsy hangings of her bed caught fire from the candle, and she was soon out of pain, and quite dead in four minutes. After he had been left hanging for an hour he was buried in Old St. Pancras Churchyard, where twenty years later his remains were disinterred, and conveyed to the family mausoleum at Stanton Harold, near Ashby-de-la-Zouche, where they now repose.

The first instance of the fulfillment of this prophecy is said to have taken place in 1822, when the birth of a black calf was followed by the ruin of the Lord of the Manor. The next instance befell at the time when the Earl of Essex, Baron Ferrers, (Queen Elizabeth's favorite) met his death on the scaffold. A black calf appeared again when the fourth Earl Ferrers of the Shirley family was hanged by all the tenth earl, finding that owing to interbreeding the herd was not in good condition, set the family traditions at naught, and with the object of strengthening the race introduced a black bull, and deliberately bred black calves.

The neighboring peasantry, whose families in some cases had farmed their holdings for centuries, shook their heads over this, predicting fresh disasters for the master of Chartley Hall. Their forebodings were justified by the events; for Lord Ferrers was overtaken by financial troubles, which forced him to sell Chartley Hall and the feudal herd, the latter being purchased by the Duke of Bedford, who transferred it to his Woburn Abbey estate, a wonderful place in Bedfordshire, in whose lovely park all sorts of extraordinary animals roam at liberty. Among the rarest of these are small wild horses from the borders of Thibet. The famous herd has, however, not thriven, and the only remaining white bull died about four years ago, without leaving any male progeny to take his place.

The Chartley Hall estate, with its 4,000 acre park, is now owned by Colonel Walter Crowe, who won his Victoria Cross while endeavoring to save the guns at the battle of Colenso, in the earlier disastrous days of the Boer War. He has been A. D. C. to Lord Kitchener, and military secretary to the Duke of Connaught. He bought up the property at the remarkably low price of \$200,000, including the most-esteemed Chartley Hall, (a part of which dates from Elizabethan times), and the wild ruins of Chartley Castle, which was built by Randolph de Blandeville, fourth Earl of Chester, on his return from the Holy Land.

The new Earl Ferrers, although he has thus lost this ancient home comes into the possession of the Stanton Harold estate, near Ashby-de-la-Zouche, in Leicestershire, which has been occupied by the Shirley family since the reign of Henry VIII, when it came into their hands through the marriage of Sir Francis Shirley to the widow and heir of Sir John Congreve, oddly enough, an ancestor of the present owner of Chartley. The house itself dates from the early part of the Elizabethan era, and is a very stately and withal homelike mansion, of red-brick, half timbered construction.

It is in the mausoleum of the Shirleys, in a sheltered nook of the park at Stanton Harold, that the late Earl Ferrers has been laid at rest, in the same vault that holds the remains of the fourth earl who was hanged at Tyburn.

**TREATY FORGOTTEN, U. S. SENATE PASSES PANAMA CANAL BILL**

Washington, Aug. 9.—The Panama Canal administration bill providing free passage to American ships, prohibiting railroad-owned vessels from using the waterway, and authorizing the establishment of a one-man government when the canal is completed, was passed by the senate tonight by a vote of 77 to 12.

The provision for free tolls which was fought out in the senate Wednesday was endorsed again just before the passage of the measure. Attached to the bill as it passed the senate were two important amendments directed at trust or railroad control of steamship lines. The first by Senator Reed, would prohibit ships owned by a illegal industrial combination, from using the canal and the second, by Senator Bourne, would force railroads to give up water lines which might otherwise be their competitors, if it were proved that they were stifling competition.

Opponents of the free toll provision for American ships, against which Great Britain made formal protest, carried their fight up to the last moment of the bill's consideration. Just before its passage, Senator Root moved to strike out the section giving free tolls to American coastwise vessels, and Senator Hoke Smith, of Georgia, moved to strike out the provision for free tolls to American ships in the foreign trade. Both of these motions were defeated by overwhelming votes.

As the bill passed, it would permit American coastwise vessels to pass through the canal free, without conditions, while American foreign trade ships might pass there free if their owners agreed to sell the vessels to the United States as a fair price in time of war or emergency.

**FISH STORIES!**

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 9.—(Special)—A dispatch from St. Ann's (C. B.), says Lieut. Ramsey, of the staff of the Duke of Cornwall, landed a 500 pound tuna yesterday. His royal highness is fishing from five to six hours each day. J. K. L. Ross has only landed one tuna in three years, and the present success is remarkable. Yesterday his royal highness had splendid luck.

Sydney, N. S., Aug. 9.—(Special)—His royal highness had some exciting sport fishing yesterday, and had a monster on his line for over an hour and lost him. The largest tuna yet caught was landed by hook last night in St. Ann's Bay by Lt. White, commander of the Earl Grey. The fish is said to weigh over 700 pounds, and is twenty feet long.
