KNOW WORDSWORTH WELL.
Aged Woman Was Caretaker of Dove Cottage.

London, June 20.—(By Mail).—The death is reported, at Town End, Grasmere, of Mrs. Mary Dove, aged 84, for many years the caretaker of Dove Cottage, Grasmere, where the poet Wordsworth lived for many years. She remembered Wordsworth well, and during her lifetime showed thousands of people from all parts of the Empire through the little rustic lime-washed cottage, once an inn, carrying the sign of the Dove and Olive Branch. Some years ago a committee of lovers of Wordsworth purchased the premises as a national monument, and visitors could always obtain a tour of the cottage from Mrs. Dove. She was a devoted friend of Wordsworth, and the last surviving connection with the days of Wordsworth, Southey, Keats and Coleridge.

DIES AS MOTHER'S BODY IS LOWERED INTO GRAVE
New York, July 10.—As the casket containing the body of his mother was being lowered into a grave at Mount Zion Cemetery, Masspeth, Queens, Joseph Handelman, of 66 East Fourth Street, Manhattan, dropped dead.

BELIEVE RICH SUNKEN SHIP IS LOCATED
London, July 21.—(A. P. by mail).—After nearly a month's salvage work, the wreck of the Prinsess and Orient liner Egypt, which was sunk off Egypt in collision early in 1922 is believed to have been located. The hull on the sunken vessel is said to amount to about \$5,000,000, and British engineers and salvage experts have undertaken to recover it.

MILK CHARGES WITHDRAWN.
The four charges against Allen E. Beyer of violation of the pasteurization act were withdrawn yesterday afternoon by Dr. J. Roy Campbell, K. C., counsel for the Board of Health after a postponement had been asked in order to obtain a copy of the new act. Several witnesses were heard. Dr. J. M. Barry and Dr. Mayes Case told of losing prescriptions for raw milk. W. O. Craft, of Millidgeville, testified that he had received milk from the plant in unsealed cans for hotels and restaurants. James D. Beyer testified that his son, the defendant, carried milk to the cans from his farm, the cows there had been inspected and found safe by Dr. Johnston. E. P. Raymond appeared for the defendant. It was reported that a new information would be laid in the case.

GOVERNOR COX'S VISIT.
Plans for a welcome to Governor Cox, of Massachusetts who will arrive in the city on Saturday, are practically completed now. A meeting of the committee in charge will be held on Friday of this week. A. H. Lindsay, publicity agent of the C. N. R., will leave Moncton on Wednesday for Boston to accompany Governor Cox back to New Brunswick. The Governor will be in Moncton on Saturday morning until Friday afternoon. L. S. Brown, general manager of the C. N. R. Atlantic region, had placed a private car at the disposal of the Governor and his party.

Dance Professors Convene in Paris
Show No Disposition to Impose New Measures Arbitrarily on Public.

Paris, June 18.—(By Mail).—If the professors of the dance who are now meeting in Paris have their way, there will be no new dances next season. They have come to the conclusion that dances are born—in the "dances"—and cannot be imposed arbitrarily upon the public.

Nevertheless, these professors, who come from many countries, are not lacking in imagination. They are proposing to introduce a new dance, the "Dance of the Future," which is a modern waltz and a new Boston.

There are the "Riviera" and the "Samba Parisienne," and a lady professor from Copenhagen proposes an attractive "Mississippi Trot," which is an agreeable variation of the one-step.

They would revive the Minuet, the Galliard, the Sarabande, the Pasaquillo and other graceful dances.

guin gave an elegant exhibition of the modern dances which still maintain their popularity with the dancing public. LONDON SMOKE NUISANCE.
Committee Makes Recommendations to L. C. C.

London, June 20.—(By mail).—A report on the question of atmospheric pollution and fog prevention was presented to the London County Council at yesterday's meeting by the Public Control Committee. It states that a large use of electricity and gas for power and other purposes in London would undoubtedly result in an improvement in the condition of the atmosphere. Four main courses of pollution mentioned are—domestic chimneys, industrial operations, railway locomotives, and steam vessels. The committee express the opinion that the existing law on the subject of smoke emission is ineffective, and requires codification; and that the Government should be urged at an early date to introduce legislation to deal with the matter.

The committee recommend that the existing enactments should be revised and codified in one self-contained statute. All new grates fitted in domestic houses or buildings used for dwelling or office purposes should be of an approved type. Local authorities should be empowered, in co-operation with manufacturers and others, to inquire into and advise upon the methods employed in the prevention of smoke in manufacturing operations, etc.; also to arrange for the training of stokers in the best methods of stoking.

The committee suggest that their recommendations should be communicated to the Minister of Health, and that he be urged to introduce a bill dealing with the whole question of smoke prevention.

Working Women Of World to Meet In Vienna Castle

Mrs. Raymond Robins, Head of International Federation, Sails to Call Parley to Order in August.

New York, July 10.—Mrs. Raymond Robins, president of the International Federation of Working Women, sailed en route for Vienna, where the biennial congress of the federation will be held, beginning August 14. Schonbrunn Castle, the summer residence of the late Emperor Franz Joseph, will be the meeting place, and here will come working women from thirty countries—cap makers, laundresses, glove and garment workers—to study questions of moment to their organizations.

The program includes reports on women's work toward peace and one on international labor organization, as well as discussions on women's trade unions, regulation of the wage of women workers, the problem of persuading women to take a greater interest in unions, and of family allowances in addition to wages. Each trade union centre is allowed to send five delegates for the first 50,000 women members, and one additional delegate for each additional 50,000 members.

The purpose of the federation is to unite organized working women, in order that they may resolve upon the means by which the standard of life of women workers throughout the world may best be raised. It is an outgrowth of the International Congress of Work-

ing Women called in Washington in 1919.

The present headquarters are in London, and the officers are Mrs. Raymond Robins, president; Dr. Marion Phillips, Great Britain, secretary; Mrs. Harriet Bell, Great Britain, treasurer. The vice-presidents represent working women in Belgium, Canada, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, France, Great Britain, Italy, Norway, Poland, South Africa and Switzerland. Mrs. Maud Swartz is vice-president for the United States.

PALESTINE EXCAVATIONS.
Harabj Was Probably Siter's City Harosheth.

London, June 21.—(By Mail).—Charles E. Mott, honorary secretary of the British School of Archaeology in Jerusalem, writes to the Times that Harabj, where excavations are being made, is on the southern edge of the Plain of Acre, north-east of Mount Carmel, in the marshes formed by the River Kishon immediately between the hills which form the western exit from the Plain of Esdraelon.

Harabj (he continues) is almost certainly Siter's city of Harosheth of Genieth mentioned in the Song of Deborah; the city where "the mother of Sisera looked out at a window and cried through the lattice, 'Why is his chariot so long in coming?'"

The excavations conducted by the school last year indicated that it had been a place of importance in the late Bronze Age, and had been then destroyed and not again reoccupied.

Were the destroyers the Israelites under Deborah and Barak? The excavations especially if inscriptions should be found, will throw much light on the early history and inhabitants of Palestine.

WATTLE AND DAUB ROOF
Relic of 14th Century Discovered at Stare.

London, June 20.—(By Mail).—During renovations at the White House Inn, Stare, near Guilford, an old roof of wattle and daub was discovered. The ceiling at the top of the stairs had been partly removed for a skylight to be placed in the roof, when the workmen found sloping up from about the level of the ceiling the wattle and daub roof, about 12 feet below the main roof. The clay in this roof is of a local soil, containing a large amount of chalk. The long, thin hazel twigs and the stouter cross pieces are remarkably well preserved. It is considered by antiquaries that the roof must have been built in the fourteenth century or earlier, and covered up about 280 and 300 years ago.
