

\$6,000 FIRE**AT MT. ELGIN**

Geo. G. Barons Chopping Mill
Completely Destroyed Early
This Morning.

From Tuesday's Daily.
At Mt. Elgin this morning, Geo. G. Barons' chopping mill, was completely destroyed by fire. Some of the contents were saved, but the loss, which will be over \$6,000, is only partly covered by insurance.
The fire broke out in the roof, and was discovered between six and seven o'clock. Many gathered near the burning building, but were powerless to render effective service as the village has no fire-fighting appliances.
The origin of the fire is not definitely known, but it is supposed to have been a spark from a passing locomotive. The mill was situated alongside the T. L. E. & P. railway.

A Monument to Hoxsey.

Pasadena, Cal., Jan. 4.—The funeral of Arch. Hoxsey, the aviator who was killed last Saturday on Dominguez field, was held here yesterday. In deference to the wishes of his mother, the attendance at the funeral was restricted to Hoxsey's personal friends among the aviators and his former associates in his home city.

Officials of the aviation meet just closed joined yesterday in a plan to erect a monument to the memory of Hoxsey on the spot where he met death. The field will be used as a permanent aviation park.
It was announced yesterday that Hoxsey's share of the prizes totaled \$6,200.

Douks For B.C.

Winnipeg, Jan. 4.—Peter Verigin, head of the Doukhobors, who arrived in this city yesterday morning, says that two thousand more Doukhobors will be removed from Saskatchewan to British Columbia this year. Fifty thousand fruit trees on their 16,000 acre tract in British Columbia came into bearing this year. With removal of these 2,000 there will be 4,000 in each province.
The plan is to have interchange of products. Saskatchewan members will ship oats and wheat to British Columbia and the coast province Doukhobors will ship fruit to Saskatchewan.

British Steamer Lost.

London, Jan. 4.—Wreckage reported picked up in the Bay of Biscay leaves no doubt of the fate of the British steamer Axim, which left London on Dec. 9 for West African ports with a crew of 30 British and German sailors and four passengers.

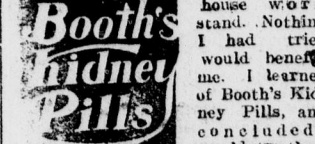

In the Outside Service.
Ottawa, Jan. 3.—The Secretary of State will at the present session of Parliament introduce a bill placing all employees of the Printing Bureau in the outside service, on the same footing as letter carriers.
Superintendent Boardman, the chief foreman, Draper, Superintendent of Bindery Allen, and Loose Leaf Ledger Expert McCarthy of the Government Printing Bureau left last night for a three weeks' tour of the big American cities, to inspect all the largest printing establishments. The object of the trip is to get the officials on the trip, to see the printers to put in effect the improvements recommended by the commission, which recently investigated and reported upon conditions at the Bureau. The party goes direct from Ottawa to Washington, where the U. S. Government Printing Bureau will be inspected.

Turned on the Power.
Dundas, Jan. 3.—Hydro-electric power was turned on for the first time in Dundas last evening, temporary connection having been made with the main inter-switching station, which is situated just outside the town limits. The first place to be lighted is the Collins' Curling Rink, one of the proprietors of which is Charles Collins, the well-known baseball player and curler, who is chairman of the civic lighting committee.

The new transformers are being installed to-day, and Dundas users will have light and power here in a few days. The main station being at Dundas, there will be no cost of transmission.

An Inventory Taken.
Washington, Dec. 31.—Believing the attitude of the Portuguese Government with regard to the property of religious corporations, held to be illegal, is misunderstood in this country, the Portuguese Minister last night made the following statement: "Directly the congregations were dissolved, an inventory of their property was taken, with a view to its proper protection, and in order that it may be surrendered to the rightful owners."

FIRE IN COLLIERY

Eight Miners Perish in Mine at Florence, N.S.

RESCUERS WORK IN VAIN

Explosion Takes Place in Sydney No. 3, When Deputies and Workmen Go Down in the Early Morning to Start the Machinery — All Eight Men Who Were on Duty Are Burned to a Cinder.

North Sydney, N.S., Jan. 4.—Not since the memorable explosion of 1878, which occurred in the Winning pit, has such a calamity disturbed the community as yesterday morning, when it was announced that Sydney No. 3 was on fire. About 4 o'clock yesterday morning, when the under deputies, Ferguson and Purchas, went into the mine, accompanied by six workmen making preparations for the starting of the mine, the explosion occurred.

The village of Florence was turned into a frenzy. People rushed to the colliery and Supt. T. J. Brown was immediately summoned. The superintendent soon got in touch with the mining department and John Johnston, accompanied by Robt. Robson and other officers, soon had the dragger apparatus upon the scene, and in a few minutes all the available workmen on the plant were combating the fire.

For eight hours Manager Johnstone, assisted by Inspector Nicholson and John W. Johnston, worked down upon No. 11 lift, and finally succeeded in finding the charred bodies of the six shift men, who were clumped together, and so burned that it was impossible to recognize one from the other.

The rescuing party worked hard to reach the No. 14 lift, in the hope of recovering the bodies of Deputies Ferguson and Purchas, but owing to the deadly gases were compelled to retreat to a place of safety. Inspector Nicholson said he never saw such a tangled mass of ruins in a colliery, and by the appearance of the inspector when he emerged from the colliery, it looked as if he had been in the fight himself.

The names of the dead are: Amos Tarrant, aged 22, single; Jos. Horlul, aged 25, single; Jas. Tramsen, aged 30, single; Fred Tremmen, aged 36, married, with six children; Alex. Aextor, aged 20, single; James Rosten, aged 25, single; Deputy Ferguson, Deputy Purchas.

Would Elect For Six Years.
Washington, Jan. 4.—Extension of the Presidential and Congressional terms of office is favored by Representative Champ Clark of Missouri, who probably will be Speaker of the next House. "I am for amending the constitution," said Mr. Clark yesterday, "so as to elect the President for one term of six years, and make him forever ineligible for re-election. Every time that there is a President extraordinarily popular, a lot of fools blame him for a third term."

"If the present term is made for six years, I am in favor of making the term of Congress three years instead of two. Then the states, falling into that rule, would have an election every three years."

Mr. Clark also is in favor of electing both the President and the representatives in Congress on the last Monday in August, and of inaugurating the President and the members of Congress on the first Monday in October.

Jamaica Mails Direct.
Kingston, Jamaica, Jan. 4.—In view of Jamaica's opposition to the transportation of the mails to England by way of Canada, the British Postmaster-General has arranged with the Elders and Fyffes Co., a British organization, controlled by the United Fruit Co., to convey the mails direct, on the termination of the Elder-Dempster service next month. The new arrangement will be on the poundage system.

The Jamaican Government has decided to amend the pure food law, and prohibit the importation of flour in bags, for sanitary reasons. Hereafter, flour must be transported to Jamaica in barrels.

Rib Punctured Lung.
Brookville, Jan. 4.—A. E. Sawyer, who has charge of the asphalt at the Grand Trunk yards, was severely injured yesterday afternoon by being crushed between the engine and the fence opposite the pit. Upon being removed to the hospital it was found that his shoulder blade was broken, also several ribs, one of which punctured the lung, causing a hemorrhage. He also suffered other internal injuries. It is feared the man cannot live.

Robbers Fled.
Vancouver, Jan. 4.—Two masked thugs, who have been operating in Vancouver, pulled off another robbery at Mount Pleasant. The Star restaurant was held up, but during the operation, passers-by alarmed the robbers, who fled without getting any money. Twenty policemen were rushed out on a special car, but no arrest was made.

For Uttering Forged Checks.
Nice, France, Jan. 4.—Jacques Spoerli, who, according to the police, has been known also as Morris, Baron Saxe and Baron Cossman, was arrested here yesterday at the request of the Paris police, charged with having uttered forged checks in the sum of \$22,000, drawn upon the Hudson Trust Co. of New York.

Burned to Death.
Liverpool, N.S., Jan. 3.—Under a heap of ruins, the body of Oliver Elniot of Liverpool was unearthed by firemen of that place at 10.30 a.m. yesterday, with the skull burned to a bone, the body scarcely touched and legs severely injured. The fire started in his bedroom, and its origin is unknown.
