### THE CHIEF INDUSTRIES OF THE CANADIAN PROVINCES

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics has been making a survey of production in Canada with a view to determining the national income. It is indicated that Nova Scotia is dependant largely upon agriculture and manufacturing for its income, with the mining industry also of importance.

Agriculture, including far farming, is the chief occupation of the people of Prince Edward Island.

In New Brunswick, farming is the chief industry, with lumber a close second. Manufacturers are also of importance.

In Quebec the manufacturing produces a greater income than any other industry. Farming holds second place and forestry third.

In the Province of Ontario a similar order prevails. The pre-eminence of manufacturing is even more marked than in Quebec. Mining and construction come next.

In Saskatchewan nearly 87 per cent of the income is derived from farming, and Manitoba and Alberta show large percentages as well. Alberta mining is also of considerable importance.

In British Columbia lumber is the chief industry although manufacturing, agriculture and mining are also of importance, indicating the versatility of the resources of the Western provinces.

The Yukon district is chiefly important on account of mining, with trapping also entering into the district's annual wealth.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

Section 137 of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1906, says:—

No person shall establish install or work any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place in Newfoundland except under and in accordance with a license granted by the Post Office.

Forms for Amateur License may be obtained at office of Minister of Posts & Telegraphs, St. John's, and call signals furnished and recorded.
