Hon. John Robinson the Only Mayor Before Mayor Barker Who Died While in Office.

A Gazette reporter had an interview this morning with Mr. J. W. Lawrence, the historian, and was kindly furnished with the following interesting information regarding the death of the only mayor of the city before Mayor Barker who has died while holding that important position.

This was the third mayor of St. John, the Hon. John Robinson, who was appointed by the government of the province in May 1816.

After holding the office of Mayor for a little over twelve years he died on Wednesday October 31 1828 at the age of 67 years and was buried on the Saturday following.

Hon. John Robinson was born in New York. He had been actively engaged in the war having joined the army at the age of 15 years, and came to this country with the disbanded troops upon the evacuation of the town of New York.

Robinson wore knee breeches and long boots with a long top. The newspapers of the time gave no account of the funeral ceremonies.

Since his death St. John has had 31 mayors, 14 of whom were appointed by the government three elected by the common council and 14 elected by the voters.

Of the 14 appointed by the government since the death of Hon. John Robinson, only one, Hon. R. L. Wilkes, who was mayor from 1860 to 1864, is still living.

Of the 14 elected by the citizens since 1864, only one, Hon. Wm. Mackenzie, who was mayor from 1878 to 1882, is still living.
