TOPEKA, Kan., Wednesday—A new Kansas record-breaking wheat crop is made. Expert grain men and wheat growers who have traversed the great wheat belt agree that the total yield will not fall much short of a hundred million bushels. This will be thirty million bushels greater than last year's crop, which was the largest in the state's history. Haivest will begin in Southern Kansas about June 10, and will continue until July 10. The State Employment Bureau estimates that fitteen thousand men from other states will be needed to help harvest, stack and thresh the crop, and that a majority of these can be assured of employment for about ninety days.
