E. F. GLADWIN A MONEY WINNER IN ALL THREE MATCHES

Other New Brunswick Marksmen Carried Off Fair Share of Prize Money at D. R. A. Meet Yesterday—Over Five Hundred Are Competing—Tyro, Bankers' and the McDougall Were Shot Yesterday.

OTTAWA, Aug. 26.—The greatest Dominion Rifle Association meet opened today with over half a thousand competitors from Canada, Great Britain, Australia and Newfoundland. The tyro, the bankers' and the McDougall matches were fired today. The day was dull and the wind shifting. However, the shooting was remarkable, the Britishers doing exceptionally well. The McDougall, at the ranges of two and seven hundred yards, was won by Captain A. T. Hunter, 12th, Aurora, Ontario, who took 825, with a score of 49. Sgt. Martin of the British team was second with the same score. Major Jones, 2nd, P. E. I., Pte. Williams, 6th, Annapolis, won 81 each, with a score of 46. Lt. Miller, 6th, Annapolis, and Capt. McKay, 6th, St. John, with 64 each; Capt. Forbes, 7th, Chatham, 64; Croftman, 7th, Truro, Mr. Dickson, Bridgetown, Sgt. Moore, 6th, Woodstock, with scores of 63 each, won 81. The tyros from the Maritime Provinces, who got into money on this match were Pte. Armstrong, 6th, Halifax; Sgt. Freese, 7th, Sussex; Sgt. McCollum, 7th, Truro, with scores of 61 each, won 84.

ALD. CHRISTIE ON WAR PATH AGAIN

Contract Over \$50 Awarded Without Tender Stirred Him Up.

Safety Board Recommends Raise For Janitor Earle and Instructs Director To Get Figures For New Ambulance

The Safety Board held a very short meeting last evening, handling business through in short order.

Janitor Earle of the central police station was granted an increase in salary of \$20 a year for the Greenhead property.

An application was received from Police Sergeant Baxter asking that compensation be given him for the time he had lost due to sickness. Half pay was granted him.

George Earle, janitor of the central police station, asked that his salary be increased to \$80 a month. His present salary is \$44.30. The salary was raised to \$55 per month.

E. B. Ham applied for a lease of three city lots on the West Side, offering a rental of \$50 a year.

There was considerable discussion on the matter.

Finally Ald. Hamm moved that the applicant be allowed to have the lots at a yearly rental of \$75.

The motion was carried five to four.

Ald. Kelley, who voted "nay," remarked after the vote that it was outrageous for every one to vote in the teeth of the director's recommendation. The director had said the land was worth \$50 a year.

D. A. McLeod applied for the lease of three city properties. He offered \$25 a year for the Greenhead property, \$50 for the Raines property, and \$100 for the McManus property. They are under lease at present.

An order was passed and carried that arbitrators be put on the properties.

Director Wisely informed the board that a communication had been received from the Hampton Woodworking Company. Representatives of the company had looked over the city lands. The city's reply would be given in three weeks.

New business was next in order and Ald. Bullock brought up the matter of obtaining a new ambulance. The one in use, he said, had never been intended to be used as such. It was a patrol wagon that had been converted into an ambulance. Patients carried in it had complained of the jolting.

Ald. Hamm gave a short dissertation on the value of various kinds of springs in carriages.

The director was then instructed to procure competitive figures of the cost of a new ambulance.

Ald. Frink asked what was done with the fire department hose which was replaced each year.

The director explained that the street department, the ferry, various mills on the Strait Shore and other establishments were yearly supplied with the hose.

Ald. McGowan next advocated the placing of a light on Chipman Hill. This at once brought Ald. Kelley to his feet for a request for a light near the ice house and Ald. Frink with an application for one on Gilbert's Lane.

Ald. Hollier remarked that each and every alderman could bring up the matter of a new light. The matter was dropped.

The fire of Ald. Christie was aroused over a bill for work for which no tenders had been called.

An order in council he said had been passed to the effect that tenders must be called when amounts concerned were more than fifty dollars.

"That order has never been obeyed. If our officials can't do what they're told to do, we can get others, that's all!"

Ald. Kelley asked why the halls of the Market Building had not been cleaned. The work had been ordered and a time set. The director explained that he was waiting until the painting was completed.

The reading of the bills was next taken up after which on motion of Ald. Bullock the board "adjourned to the Opera House."

A gang of toughs that have lately made it their practice to gather in the evenings at the corner of Minnette and St. John streets, West End, have made themselves so obnoxious to residents of that section of Clifton that a complaint is likely to be made to the police. Besides annoying passersby these roughs also, it is said, have gone so far as to break in doors and windows in the neighborhood. So far the gang has kept away from the police.
