COMMERCIAL

LONDON, Mar. 10.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserve decreased £438,000; circulation decreased £275,000; bullion decreased £713,000; other securities decreased £513,000; other deposits increased £1,923,000; public deposits decreased £2,572,000; notes reserve decreased £227,000; government securities unchanged. The proportion of the bank's reserve to liability this week is 60.32 per cent; last week it was 59.72 per cent.

General Elec. and International Paper declined large fractions.

FORTY BURIED IN RUINS OF BUILDING

PITTSBURGH, Mar. 10.—Forty men, mostly foreigners, employed in raising the ruins of the building destroyed by fire Monday, were buried by falling walls early today. The workers, from the debris and in hospital, severely injured.

Three more workmen are reported to have been taken from the works dead. Five foreigners are in the South Side Hospital seriously crushed. One workman died on the way to the hospital.

REACHES PORT AFTER TERRIBLE VOYAGE

\$400,000 Raise for Pittsburgh's Employees

PORTLAND, Me., March 9.—After a terrible voyage of 24 days in which she was badly battered and three of the crew injured, one having his leg and arm broken, the steamer *Albatross*, Captain J. W. Lang, arrived late this afternoon with a cargo of china clay, for Portland and Boston parties. For twenty days the steamer had been tossed about in a most perilous sea, her deck being under water and the captain's cabin stiff, flooded, at one time, the only way the engineers could get out was through the skylight.
