#### AMERICA'S FIRST ANTIMONY SMELTER STARTED YESTERDAY

As there is an unimited market for the finished product at \$150. a ton, it will be seen that the mine will rank as one of the leading industries of the province. A Standard reporter was last night shown a small ingot of the stuff turned out at the mine. It showed the fern-like marks on its surface, without which antimony cannot be rated as first class.

The establishment of the smelter and its adjacent works marks an entirely new departure in the method of dealing with the mineral resources in the ore and ship it to a distance to be treated. At Lake George, how ever, the deposit is so large that it cannot be handled without installing a smelter on the spot to deal with the output. A great saving is thus effected in time and the cost of operation is lessened in many ways. 
