EASTER WELL OBSERVED IN SAINT JOHN, YESTERDAY

Weather Not All That Could be Desired but Usual Parade Proved Even Larger and More Elaborate than Ever—Special Services in the Churches Attract Large Crowds Florists Found Business Brisk.

Easter of 1912 was well observed in St. John. Whether it was in anticipation of the bright future which has dawned for the city instilling new vigor into its people, or whether it was the first breath of spring, a joyful spirit seemed to prevail, and all seemed to enter into the spirit of the occasion with zest. The preparations for the observance were on a more elaborate scale than ever, almost rivalling those of Christmas. According to prominent merchants Saturday trade was much in advance of last year in fact a leading shoe concern found it necessary to close their doors for an hour during the afternoon in order to keep pace with the rush. In other branches of business equally encouraging results were obtained. All day an endless stream thronged the streets and a visitor could not fail to be impressed with the air of prosperity which seemed to fill the crowd. Sunday, from a weather standpoint, was not an ideal day for the display of Easter raiment, yet the annual church parade, which is growing larger and more elaborate as the city increases in size and wealth, was held as usual and persons who met the crowds of Sunday morning worshippers could not but remark that the church-going population of St. John was exceedingly well dressed and prosperous looking. The morning was fine and was the time when the new Easter millinery was seen at its best for a whiff of fog and a whisper of rain in the afternoon was sufficient to drive the new hat wearers to cover. Nevertheless, St. John looked its best yesterday. In the churches the usual special programmes of music were well rendered and the floral decorations were also of a special nature, marking the end of the Lenten period of mourning and the arrival of the Easter time of joy.

One feature of the Easter observance which is becoming more general every year is the purchase of flowers either for purposes of home decoration or as offerings for Easter remembrances to friends and relatives. There was a larger trade done by the florists this year than in former seasons and the displays in all the congeries of bloom were well in keeping with the occasion. Not only were there very many gifts of flowers to private individuals, but the inmates of the various institutions such as the hospital, the home for incurables and the home for the aged, were all remembered most generously.

The day was well kept in the churches of the several denominations. Special services were held and the congregations were exceptionally large.

Stone Church. In Stone church the day was marked by the introduction of the vested choir into the services. The surplice choir assisted at the morning and evening services. A special programme of sacred music was rendered and the choir was heard with satisfaction. The choir numbers forty-six voices: twenty-two ladies, twelve men and twelve boys. The music provided by the choir on its initial appearance was of a particularly high order, being specially worthy of mention. At both services Mrs. C. F. Robertson and C. A. Munro sang acceptably.

The floral decorations in the church were another feature of the day's observance. The color scheme was white and green and was carried out with pleasing effect. A profusion of palms and lilies being conspicuous. The pastor, Rev. C. A. Kurling, preached at the morning and evening services as well as at a special children's service at 3 o'clock at which the boys' division of the vested choir assisted.

Catholic Churches. In the Catholic churches the congregations were large at all the services. In the Cathedral the members of the Holy Name Society received

Holy Communion in a Body. At 11 o'clock Parnassus Mass was celebrated by His Lordship Bishop Casey, assisted by Revs. A. W. Mehan, D. O'Keefe, E. O'Brien and E. J. Conway. The sermon of the day was preached by Rev. D. S. O'Keefe, who delivered an eloquent and forceful oration on the subject of the resurrection.

In the afternoon at 3:15 His Lordship again officiated when Pontifical Mass was sung.

The masses in St. Peter's church were at 7, 9 and 11 o'clock. At 9 o'clock children's mass was celebrated, at which there was special music by the children's choir.

Solemn High Mass was celebrated at 10:30 o'clock by Rev. Fr. Borgmann, assisted by Revs. A. J. Duke, Maloney, and O'Regan, as deacon, subdeacon and master of ceremonies, respectively. A scholarly sermon on the resurrection was delivered by Rev. Fr. Duke. The floral decorations were elaborate, a representation of the resurrection being noticeable.

In Holy Trinity and St. John the Baptist churches sermons appropriate to the day were given.

Baptist Churches. The primary class of the Germaln Street Baptist church celebrated Easter yesterday afternoon when an interesting programme was carried out, after which the little ones and their teachers made their annual visit to the Protestant Orphans' Home, where they donated several dozen eggs. To do this each child brought an egg to Sunday school and the sum total thereof was considerable.

The morning service of the Germaln Street Baptist church yesterday the pastor, Rev. F. S. Porter, baptized seven applicants from the Sunday school.

The Charlotte Street Baptist church was beautifully decorated in honor of the Easter services yesterday, with lilies, potted plants and cut flowers. Large congregations attended both services and at the morning service the pastor, Rev. J. A. Archibald, baptized fourteen converts, while at the evening service the hand of fellowship was extended to twenty-two new members.

BUILDING GUTTED BY FLAMES, FIREMEN HAVE CLOSE SHAVE

Six Toronto Fire Fighters Overcome by Smoke in Burning Structure—Rescued in Nick of Time.

Toronto, April 7.—Fire starting on the second story of the J. I. Fee building, 64 Front street east, yesterday afternoon, did over \$4000 damage to the building and about \$20,000 damage to the stock, all fully insured. The building was almost gutted. Lieut. Hughes, of Queen street fire hall and four men Oliver Poole, John Best, William Sheitz and George Sinclair, of Berkeley street fire hall, were overcome by smoke while working on the ladders and were rescued from dangerous positions by their comrades.

TROUBLES IN CHINA STILL CONTINUE TO THREATEN PEOPLE

Shanghai, April 7.—Premier Tang Shao Yi, his suite and the members of the cabinet plan to leave for Peking on April 11. Reports from all centres in the southern provinces indicate considerable uneasiness especially among foreigners. The republican officials admit that the situation is grave. The troops are discontented because of arrears in their pay and they cannot be disbanded until the finances are adjusted. They openly blame the combination of foreign bankers for the trouble because of their refusal to give the promised assistance.

Considerable evidence of bitterness against foreigners irrespective of nationality can be discerned among the leaders who assert that the protracted delay in the recognition of the Republic by the powers and the withholding of the loans are liable to stir up anti-foreign sentiment and entail serious disturbances for which, they say, the powers alone will be responsible.

New York, N. Y., April 6.—A protective committee for the holders of the \$5,000,000 five year debentures of the Pere Marquette, which was placed in the hands of receivers yesterday was formed here today. Alexander Hemphill, president of the Guaranty Trust Company, is chairman. Committees for the protection of the holders of the other outstanding securities of the road are expected to be formed early next week.
