COULN COUNTY TRANSACTED
ROUTINE BUSINESS YESTERDAY

St. John County Hospital Commission will Call for
Tenders for Building on Merritt Street, in Near
Future—Plan to Erect Morgue—Ask Extension of
Street Railway to Little River.

Most of the business before the
meeting of the county council yesterday
was of a routine nature. The St.
John County Hospital commissioners
reported that they would shortly call
for tenders for putting up a building
on Merritt street. A petition, asking
that negotiations be opened with a
view to having the street railway run
down to Little River was approved.

Coun. McLellan announced that he
hoped to proceed with the erection of
a morgue before long.

Those present were Couns. Howard,
Smith, St. Martin, Carson, Stephen-
son, Shillington, Simonds, Golding,
Long, Bryant, Lancaster, McLellan,
St. John, Dean, Corcoran, Mus-
quash.

On recommendation of the Finance
Committee the secretary was instructed
to decline payment of any further
expenses in connection with the Viola
Reid trial, and to take up with the local
government the question of having
the expenses placed upon the
County of Sunbury.

The Finance Committee recommended
that Dr. E. Berryman's account of
\$154.50 as coroner, including a charge
of \$50 for hire of automobiles on view
of the body of Miss Davis and two
others drowned in Loch Lomond be paid.
While admitting the fairness of charge
under the exceptional circumstances,
the committee desired it to be under-
stood that the payment thereof should
not be considered as a precedent. The
recommendation was carried.

Fees received for entrance permits
into the Lancaster sewers will be placed
in a separate account in the Bank
of Nova Scotia.

It was decided to empower the regis-
trar of deeds to consolidate the indexes
from book 102 to 122 inclusive, at a
cost of \$55, the work to be completed
about January, 1914.

To Call for Tenders.
The St. John County (Tuberculosis)
Commission reported that arrange-
ments had been made to proceed with
the erection of the hospital on Mer-
ritt street, that plans and specifica-
tions had been prepared, and that ten-
ders would be called for in a short
time. The commission asked for an
advance of \$200 and this was voted,
and charged to next year's assessment.

Coun. McLellan pointed out that the
conditions of the proposed bond issue
of \$50,000 on account of the county
hospital had not been determined. He
moved that interest at 4 1/2 p. c. payable
half yearly at New York and Boston,
and this was adopted.

Improve Sewerage Extension.
The following resolution was moved
by Coun. Golding, seconded by Coun.
Long:

"That the plan of the Lancaster sewer-
age extension be amended as fol-
lows: By laying a new sewer from
man hole No. 38 in Charlotte street
extension across the rear of lots front-
ing on Lancaster Avenue owned by
Daniel C. Clark, F. W. Henderson,
John Ballie, Samuel H. Clark, J. Ver-
ner Kierstead, Geo. E. Davies and
Charles Morrison.

That the sewer of Lancaster Avenue
from man hole No. 40 to man hole No.
42 be abandoned, and that the sewer
in Winslow street extension be paid
100 feet from man hole 46, provid-
ed that free easement or right of way
be granted from Charlotte street ex-
tension across the lots referred to.
The resolution was adopted without
discussion.

Coun. Bryant submitted a bill of \$162
for surveying the county line between
Lancaster and Musquash, and it was
ordered paid out of contingencies ac-
count and charged to the two parishes.

Coun. Bryant said that in highway taxes,
but it owed the men working on the
roads over \$1,000. He wanted authori-
ty to make an order to pay wages.
Two-thirds of the uncollected taxes
should be paid in before the end of
the year.

Coun. McLellan said the council had
no authority over the Highway Board.
The secretary agreed with this and
the matter was dropped.

A petition from residents of East
St. John and Little River, addressed to
the councillors of the Parish of Si-
monds, requesting that negotiations be
opened with the St. John Street Railway
with a view to the extension of its
track from Kane's Corner to Little
River, was read; and it was decided
to comply with the prayer of the petition.

Coun. Long said the fund of \$200 for
the Bay Shore policemen was exhaust-
ed and he moved that the policeman
be kept on till November and arrange-
ments made for to pay him.

Coun. Bryant seconded this and it
was adopted.

Coun. McLellan said he had plans
for a concrete building which would
cost about \$1,750; it would be a one
story structure. He hoped to find a
site and make a start on the building
in a short time.

Increase in Wages.
Sam Clifford and W. J. Cunningham,
turnkeys in the jail, made a petition
for increase of pay on the ground that
their duties as well as the cost of living
had increased. Their wages are now
\$40.

Coun. Dean—What hours are they
on duty?
Coun. Howard said the cost of liv-
ing was high in St. John and the turn-
keys are on duty 15 hours a day.

On motion of Coun. Bryant it was
decided to grant the turnkeys an in-
crease of 45 per month.

A letter was received from Premier
Fleming stating that the county
owed the Provincial Hospital \$500 on
account of infection fees. The coun-
ty secretary said that about 3 years ago
the county objected to the large main-
tenance account charged against it
by the Provincial Hospital; it showed
that it was being charged for patients
that did not belong to it, and several
thousand dollars had been written off.
This \$500 infection charge was, he
thought, an item of the account writ-
ten off.

General Business.
Coun. McLellan brought up the mat-
ter of the liability of the councillors
for St. Martin for road work author-
ized by them. The councillors have
made themselves personally liable,
because they had authorized advances
to the Highway Board. The Highway
Board was indebted to the county, but
had spent all its money.

The county secretary read corre-
spondence with H. M. Blair, secretary
of the Provincial Department of Pub-
lic Works in regard to the matter.
The correspondence showed a mis-
take had been made, and Mr. Blair
wrote that the Provincial Department
of Public Works would reimburse the
county as soon as the county secre-
tary collected enough taxes to repay
the advance. Under the act, highway
taxes of non-residents and corpora-
tions are payable to the county secre-
tary, who turns it over to the High-
way Board for expenditure in speci-
fied districts. It seems that George
W. Brown, a district commissioner,
collected the highway tax directly
from the Pelopon Lumber Co., and
spent the money in his own district.

In expectation that certain taxes
would be paid into the county secre-
tary's office, the parish councillors of
St. Martin had authorized the High-
way Board to draw money to repair
bad places on the highway.

Coun. McLellan—It is possible to
meet the expenditure by special as-
sessment?
Coun. Secretary—No.

Coun. McLellan said there was \$345
which was illegally spent. Where
was the money spent?
Coun. Secretary—Mr. Brown's dis-
trict, No. 6.

Coun. McLellan pointed out that the
Pelopon Lumber Company had property
in four districts, and it was not fair
to spend all the company's tax in one
district.

Coun. Secretary—It was not legal
either to spend the money in one dis-
trict.

Coun. Howard thought there would
be difficulty getting the money, as
there were now comparatively no
highway taxes due to the county.

Coun. McLellan moved that the
county secretary be instructed to
write to the government asking that
the county be reimbursed the sum of
\$345 paid over for highway under a
misunderstanding. This was adopted.
Council adjourned.

Fredericton, Oct. 7.—A section
of the cattle sheds at the Fredericton
exhibition grounds, on Smythe street,
were destroyed by fire this afternoon.

The fire originated from children play-
ing with matches in the grass outside
the fair grounds. The loss is slight
and covered by insurance.

Construction Co.; E. C. Colby, man-
aging director of the Concrete Con-
structions Co.; Dr. B. M. Mullin, J.
Fred Ryan and A. B. Kitchen, left this
morning on a tour of inspection of the
highways and road diversions on the
Valley Railway route between this
city and Andover. They will go to
Woodstock today and will start for
Andover tomorrow, returning here on
Thursday.
