ONE YEAR'S EXPENDITURE ON BRIDGES IN COUNTY.

How much St. John County Bridges Received in the Fiscal Year of 1913.

COUNTY MEMBERS' NOT NEGLECTFUL

Statement also illustrates careful method employed in bridge matters—Business-like system followed throughout Province.

The following statement of the expenditure on ordinary bridges in St. John county during the fiscal year 1913 will be of interest for two reasons. In the first place it illustrates that the representatives of the county in the Provincial Legislature, Messrs. J. B. M. Baxter and T. B. Carson, have not neglected the interests of their constituents, and secondly it furnishes an idea of the complete manner in which the itemized bridge accounts are kept. Opposition newspapers have criticised the provincial records dealing with bridges on the ground that wage accounts appear there under the heading of "various persons" and have insinuated that under this heading might be concealed some accounts which the public did not receive full benefit. From the following statement giving in detail an accounting of every cent expended upon the St. John county bridges last year it can easily be seen that if the provincial records, as published, were to contain every name and amount as set forth here the size of those volumes would have to be many times increased.

In every county in the province the same system of complete accounting is carried on and the bridge funds are wisely and well expended in the interests of the several counties. The total sum expended in St. John county during the last fiscal year was \$5,576.25, and the detailed statement is as follows:
