## TEUTONS RETIRE BEFORE THE BRITISH AND FRENCH

## BRITISH AND FRENCH ARE STILL WINNING

Both Armies Gradually Approaching Strongly Fortified Town of St. Quentin, Held by German Army---British Improve Position West of Croisilles and Also Enter Enemy Trenches Northeast of Loos.

FRENCH MAKE IMPORTANT ADVANCE AND TAKE POSITION EXTENDING OVER FRONT ABOUT TWO MILES AND A HALF, EMBRACING CAS-TRES AND ESSIGNY-LE-GRAND - FROM THE SOMME TO THE AISNE FRENCH CONTINUE BIG OFFENSIVE MOVEMENT.

Paris, Mar. 25.—Another important advance has been made by the French in their movement against the strongly defended town of St. Quentin, the war office reporting tonight that the position embracing Castres and Essigny-Le-Grand, extending over a front of about two and a half miles, has been taken.

Heavy fighting has been in progress in various sectors, and the French report Jarge German losses. The text of the official statement

"From the Somme to the Aisne our troops continue their offensive mevement. During the course of the day a desperate struggle followed a strong defense by the enemy, but our soldiers, aroused by the specials of the ravages committed by the Germans, everywhere drove back the adversary, who suffered serious losses.

Drive Enemy Back.

"Between the Somme and the Oise we drove the enemy out of the important position of Castres Essign's Le-Grand and Hill 121. A violent German counter-attack between Essign's and Benay, was broken down by our Bre.

"South of the Oise our troops penetrated several points in the Basse Foret de Couey and reached the out-skirts of Folembray and Coucy-Le-Chateau. German troops on the march in the direction of Folembray were caught under the fire of our batteries and dispersed with heavy losses.

"North of Solssons we increased our gains and repulsed two counter-attacks directed against the Vregny-Margival front.

"Active artillery fighting on both sides took place in the 'region of Craonne (northeast of Solssons.)

The Verdun Front.

"On the Verdun front our batteries offectively shelled the German organizations of Hill 304 and northwest of Bezonvaux.

Berlin War Office Admits

Berlin, via Bayville, Mar. 25—On the Russian, Roumanian and Macodonian fronts only artillery and raiding activities were in evidence yesterday, according to today's report on these war areas. The statement reads:

"Eastern front: A surprise attack near Samman, on the Dvina, resulted in twenty-one Russians coming into our hands. In several sectors, notably near Smorgon, west of Lutak and near Brody and Brzezany, the artillery activity temporarily increased.

"Roumanian front: The situation during the thaw is unchanged.

"Macedonian front: North of Monastir our raiding detachments cleared out a nest of French riffemen which had remained before our positions.

"Western front: During the bright weather there was lively artillery activity on the Flanders and Artois fronts.

"Southeast of Ypres our mine-throwers carried out efficient shelling. Reconnoitering troops advancing after this, found the trenches completely destroyed and evacuated by the enemy.

Petrograd, March 24, via London.—The capture by Russian troops of the Persian town of Kerind, in the sector west of Kermanshah, about 40 miles from the Mesopotamian border, is an nounced by the war office. Pursuit of the Turks toward the Mesopotamian border continues.
