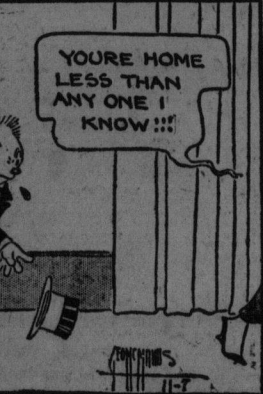

Some Canadian Political Topics

Frederick Clegner and The Times—Canada's Success in Settling Soldiers on the Land—What Free Trade Won't Do.

The Hon. J. K. Flemming Case.
Frederick Clegner: The absurd
St. John Times says, on behalf of
the Renter Government—

The Renter government decided
not to proceed further at present with
the action against Mr. Flemming in
the affidavit of Mr. Flemming's
physician, who said: "He is
now confined to his bed in a very
poor condition and is unable to care
for himself and the prospects of his
recovery arising from bed are almost
nil."

The Hon. J. K. Flemming was in
the hospital when the action was started,
considerably more than a year ago;
his condition then was generally ad-
mitted to be serious. Yet his pro-
secutors continued their efforts per-
sistently and seemed to glory in adver-
tising in the organs of the Government
their determination to seek satisfac-
tion through the courts at any cost.
It was when the Hon. Mr. Flemming
was thought to be on his death-bed,
when his friends and the public ex-
pected the end to come at any moment
that the prosecution took on its
most intense measure of party and per-
sonal vindictiveness—when the district
lawyer, freely admitted, was to be
seen in every move of the politicians
behind the action. If it were proper
to make public interests for the Govern-
ment to proceed to prosecute, under
such conditions, the propriety, the
duty, is there yet. The Govern-
ment cannot easily escape the
responsibility. The facts are yet
fresh in the memory of the people,
who are not misled by this recent
move. We repeat, "The Provincial
Government has decided not to pro-
ceed further in its action against the
Hon. J. K. Flemming through which
it sought to have certain moneys
returned. This is the natural result
of a long-drawn-out affair which had
its start in the efforts of the present
Government to play politics. Now
what the purpose cannot be further
pursued, action is abandoned."

On The Land.
Montreal Star: We have at least
one thing on which to congratulate
ourselves; we have made a much bet-
ter job of inducing returned soldiers
to take up land than we did after the
South African war, in spite of the fact
that there now are far more soldiers
and less available good land. The
latest figures from Ottawa are most
encouraging. Over forty thousand
and five hundred soldiers have taken ad-
vantage of the excellent plan propo-
sed before their return, and of these,
over thirty thousand have obtained
legitimate qualification certificates,
that is, have been able to show that
they know enough about farming to
justify giving them aid. A large num-
ber of these will be actually on the

Housing Schemes.

In France: Montreal is short of
houses and Montreal is doing nothing
to get them. While Toronto, Ottawa
and the other cities of Ontario are
displaying the greatest energy in
housing their peoples; while "Sleepy
Quebec" as certain people delight to
call the Old Capital is preparing plans
for the laying out of a model garden
suburb at the cost of a million and a
half; while Sherbrooke, St. Anne de
Bellevue, Three Rivers, Hull and
other cities have put the work in
hand and have already made ap-
preciable progress the metropolis stands
with its arms folded and -- waits.
The City Administration does not ap-
pear to have done all it should have
done to assure the building of houses.
For several weeks past the Adminis-
trative Commission names for this
purpose has had no president and
only three members instead of five
think that it can leave entirely to
others the responsibility of supplying
the houses that the workers stand in
need of. That is the sort of inaction
that becomes more and more danger-
ous as it is prolonged. We have al-
ready reached the winter months. Let
us take advantage of this fact to de-
vises a plan so that we will be ready
to make an early start in the coming
spring.

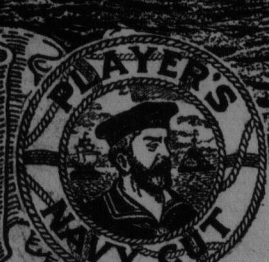
