

### CARLETON-VICTORIA SUPPORTERS OF GOVT MEET IN CONVENTION

#### Hon. B. Frank Smith Receives Unanimous Nomination for Government Standard Bearer—Confident of Victory All-Pledge United Support to the Meighen Cause.

Woodstock, N. B., Oct. 20.—Hon. B. Frank Smith is the man for Carleton-Victoria. In response to the call to all friends of the Conservative Party in this riding to meet in the Grand Theatre this afternoon to nominate a candidate, hundreds of the stalwarts met, and the result of their deliberations was to choose Frank Smith as the standard bearer, and the selection was received with great applause.

Mr. Smith, upon taking his seat upon the platform, was heartily applauded. He spoke briefly and was followed in a short address by Hon. Mr. Baxter, both of whom spoke more fully at the evening meeting. W. S. Sutton, the defeated candidate, said he was the happiest man in the Convention. ### Spends \$15,000,000 in Nine Months For Foreign Relief Work

America Red Cross Assn. Files Report at Paris.  
Paris, Oct. 19.—Total expenditures of the American Red Cross in foreign relief work during the past ending July 1, 1921, were more than \$15,000,000. According to a statement by the Paris headquarters, that expenditure was divided as follows: European child-health program \$1,740,000; Junior Red Cross \$421,000; Prussian refugee \$430,000; General European relief \$11,002,000; Chinese famine relief \$1,000,000; League of Red Cross societies \$234,000; Miscellaneous expenditures \$769,000.




