London, May 6.—The Norwegian barque Luna, which sailed from Table Bay on April 3 for Halifax, has arrived at St. Helena with her captain dead.

According to the record of American and toreign shipping, the master of the barque Luna, was M. B. Nielsen, who was also owner of that vessel.

San Francisco, May 6—Reinsurance on the ship Manchester from New York to Yokonoma, 253 days out, has advanced from 65 to 66 per cent. The Manchester is a big, ilumsy ship, not noted for speed. The only other overdue ship on the list now is the American vessel John McDonald, which remains at 90 per cent relaystrance. It is the general belief that the coal has taken fire, and that the ship and all on board have perished. The McDonald is out 27 days from Baltimore for this city.
