FREDERICTON FAIR HAS BIG SURPLUS

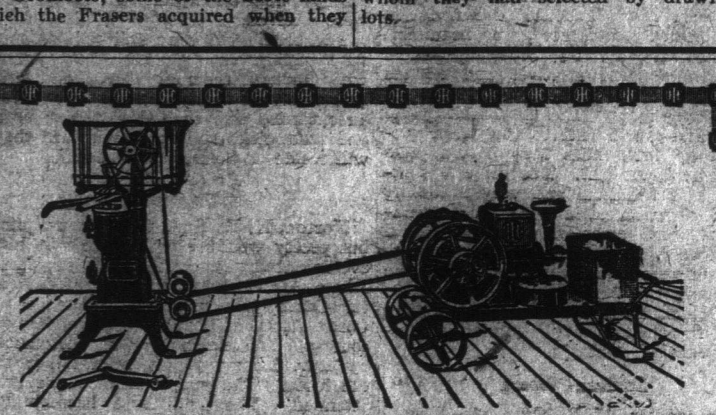
Statement Shows \$6,000 to the Good—Capital Baseball Team Has a Deficit.
Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 27—The services of two brain agents who have been running on the Canada Eastern section of the Intercolonial since August first have been dispensed with by the management. They were not very popular with the train crews or patrons of road and little regard is left over their departure.
J. J. McCaffrey, the man behind the Fredericton baseball club, has handed out a statement of receipts and expenses. The total receipts for the season were \$92,170, leaving a deficit of \$680-11. The gate receipts totalled \$83,950, subscriptions \$1,800, and percentage of foreign games, \$2,870.90. The largest item of expense was salaries, \$4,878.98.
Fredericton ladies, who were lately entertained by Lady Ashburham at Ashburham Place, Sussex, Eng., write in glowing terms of the hospitality extended to them.

A surplus of \$6,000 more has been estimated by the directors of Agricultural Society No. 94 for the Fredericton 1913 exhibition. The figures named happen to be the amount of a mortgage placed on the building property less than two years ago. If the surplus on the show amounts to \$6,000, it is likely that \$4,000 of the amount will be devoted to paying off the mortgage, and a new mortgage for \$2,000 arranged. That will leave \$1,000 for paying interim expenses between now and the next biennial show; and another \$1,000 to provide a new roof for the main building, which is badly needed. With the single exception of amusements, the receipts from all departments of this year's show were greater than at any former show.

Willard Kitchin, who is removing to Vancouver (B. C.), has disposed of his residence and farm in Kingsclear to his brother, H. G. Kitchin, who plans to occupy it, his present residence to be occupied by his son, Albert Kitchin. It is understood the purchase price was between \$10,000 and \$12,000.
Fraser, Limited, plan to manufacture as much as twelve million superficial feet of lumber at Victoria Mills next season. James M. Scott, of this city, is making logging arrangements. A large part of the twelve millions of lumber will be cut in the vicinity of Fredericton, a good deal of it, along the St. John River and its streams between here and Woodstock, and a further quantity on the Oromocto, some of the best lands which the Frasers acquired when they occupied by his son, Albert Kitchin. It is understood the purchase price was between \$10,000 and \$12,000.
