

Ottawa, Aug. 25—Reports of homestead entries in western Canada during
May and June show that free Canadian
land is still available to immigrants from
enemy countries.

During May, ten Germans, and 208
Austro-Hungarians made homestead entries, and during June, sixteen Germans
and 211 Austro-Hungarians.

The total of homestead entries for the
two months was 3,878 a decrease of
2,070 as compared with May and June of
last year.
