from their "nearest neighbour" have mon found them elvos in the centre of prosperous farming communitius.

Villages and towns, with their churches, their schools, their mills, stores and hotela, hare sprung into existence with a rapidity almost mprecedented and many places at which but a short time since there was nothing but the desolate prairie are now centres at which a large basiness is transacted and in which the value of property has risen to a height which it would be difficult to exaggerate.

I cannot beiter illustrate this than by the following statistics, with statistics which the Post masters of the several places mentioned have furnish- shewing their ed me, the figures in which, though they may not be in every case rapid growth. critically correct, are jerhaps as nearly co as it is possible for a rough estimate to mako them.


The rapidity of railway construction during the present year bas Rapidity of perhaps never been equalled. Notwithstandiug the difficulties which the contractors, Messrs. Langdon \& Sheppard experienced in the spring from the floods as well as from the scarcity of labour, they have during the present year built the 315 miles botweon Flat mark dous Creek (Oak Lake Station, 165 miles West of Winnipeg) and Swift Current, 510 miles west of Winnipeg, on which daily passenger and freight traine are now running.

Eefore the 31 st instant they expect to have the track (a portion of which is already laid) completed 91 miles further west to Maple Creek, which will probably be the base of operations for next 3-D
