domain a further quantity of lands to enable the disposition of the Indian Reserve to take place. In the one case, it is only making the lands in question supply every thing necessary for their being sold, and thus made profitable to the Indians. In the other it is calling on the Crown in fact to increase the amount of its appropriation for the Indians by the amount of one seventh of the tract originally set apart for their occupation.

With regard to the Crown Reserves the Committee are of opinion none ought to be made out of the tract, because it was not intended that the Crown should derive any advantage from the transaction; but they think the reservation for the clergy rests on a different footing, it is a quasi tax on the disposition of the property which ought to be borne by the party for whose benefit the sale takes place, not by the Crown which has no beneficial interest in the transaction.
