

5. Residents of the United States who are Neither
Citizens of the United States or of Canada

Canada has, of course, prohibited the entry into of Canada of persons who are citizens of enemy countries. Apart from this, Canada has since the outbreak of war made no changes in its regulations governing the admission to Canada as tourists of persons who are permanent legal residents of the United States but who are not citizens thereof. Such persons are permitted to enter Canada if they can satisfy the Canadian immigration officer at the border that they will have no difficulty in securing reentry to the United States. In order to do this they will now, because of the new United States regulations, have to produce either a border identification card or a reentry permit, both of which are issued by the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service.
