he had built near the Etchemin river at Levi,—too lavish in his expenditure and unlucky in many of his innumerable milling operations, with heavy liabilities unprovided for. Sir John, on his dismissal from office in 1832 owed the Crown \$100,000; this amount was subsequently repaid in full out of the revenues of the seigniory of Lauzon and other estates taken possession of by Government. He died at Bangor, U.S., in 1845.
