head of Christendom on this all important subject of the indissolubility of the marriage bonds; and we may well rejoice that it is so. Ťł

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Of course there may be found clergy in the Church who will perform the marriage ceremony over divorced persons. Archbishop Cranmer, we know, granted a divorce to Henry VIII. and remarried him, but he did it in direct violation of the Law of the Church. In the same way a bishop of Rome may grant a dispensation for an unworthy cause, but the blame then attaches to him, not to the Church whose laws he is supposed to interpret faithfully.

THE CIVIL LAWS.

But it may be asked, if the Law of God is so plain, how comes it that divorces for a variety of causes are granted not only in the United States, but also in Great Britain and elsewhere. The answer is that we are in the same condition now as the Church was before the time of Constantine. Ecclesiastical Law and Civil Law are not in agreement. So long as



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
