HOME FROM JAMAIGA.

Ex-Primer Ross Returns Much Benefit-ted But Still Lame.

Ex-Prmier Ross Returns Much Benefitted But Still Lame.

Toronto, April 19.—Hon. G. W. Ross. Miss Ross and Miss Mabel Ross arrived in the city yesterday morning after a six or seven weeks' sojourn in Jamalca. Their arrival was expected only by members of the family, several of whom were at the Union Depot to meet them. They drove direct to the family residence, I Elmsley Place.

The ex-Premier is tanned and looks exceedingly well. He was cheerful in manner and conversation, but naturally, owing to his absence from the scene, was not able to discuss Provincial or Federal politics. He intimated that he would not take his seat in the House until after the Easter recess.

"Although my rheumatism has not been very much relieved by my sojourn in Jamalca," he said in reply to several inquiries, "the rest has been most valuable to me. I come back almost entirely innocent of what has occurred here during my absence, as the last Canadian paper I saw, until this morning, was dated March, 30, and 1 had been wondering whither Mr. Whitney had got his address from the Throne through the House, and whether Sif Wilfrid Laurier had got over the initial stage of his autonomy bill. I have therefore some arrears to make up in newspaper reading, which no doubt will be exceedingly interesting."

Mr. Ross and his daughters left Toronto on Fabruary 22, and reached Jamalca on March 3. For three weeks they lived out in the country, near Kingston, and for the last three weeks of their stay at the hot sulphur springs forly miles from Kingston, and they had to drive that distance across the country to get their steamer.

# TEACHERS IN

Annual Gathering of the West Kent Institute Opened To-day

The acting president asked the secretary to appoint a committee to deal with the recommendations of the Provincial Educational Association.

He especially advised the leaving of the scientific aspect of the subject for more advanced students and the confining of the Public school work to observing the manner of life of the insects that the children are familiar with and learning facts about these, that every one should know.

HARD TO GET QUORUM.

Ottawa April 19.—The Easter exodus has begun and the whips are having a herculean task in keeping the necessary quorum in the House. Yesterday the front Government bench was entirely deserted after the orders of the day were called, and ten members of the Government side held the fort during the autonomy debate.

No Canada-Mexico Line.
Ottawa, April 19.—The proposed steamship service between Canada and Mexico on the Atlantic coast has/fallen

Mexico on the Atlantic coast has fallen through. The Mexican Government regused to contribute anything for a line that calls at Cuban ports on their way to and from Canada, and it is impossible to get any steamship company that will take the contract under those terms. The Department of Trade and Commerce will offer a subsidy to a line of steamships to Cuba, connecting the Bahamas, for a monthly service all the year around between Canada and Europe, calling at Charlottetown, Hajifax and Nassau. In summer the steamers will start at Montreal, and in winter the terminus will be Halifax. The department expects to have the line established this season. through. The Mexican Government re

Contract Awarded.

Toronto, April 19.—The contract for 44,000 feet of ten-inch cast iron tubing to be used in installing the pneumatic postal system in Toronto and Montreal, has been awarded by the Dominion Government to the Alexander Maclaren Co. of Glasgow at \$1.50 per foot. The work of digging the trench and laying the pipe will be done by the Toronto Pneumatic Tube Co., a branch of a Bostom cencern. No Canadian firm tendered for the tubing and Canadian firm tendered for the tubing and Canadian labor must be employed wherever possible in the work of installation. The distance to be covered is estimated at 18,000 feet. The entire cost is placed at 3200,000.

Listowel, April 19.—The Mannel House, operated by John Welsh, was discovered on fire early yesterday morning. It was a frame structure, opposite the Grand Trunk depot. The brilding and contents were entirely destroyed. The loss is about \$4,000.
