SECOND BRANCH OF THE C. M. B. A. AT OTTAWA.

On Friday evening, January 18th, 1884, at one of the rooms of the Canadian Institute, York street, Ottawa, the special deputy, Mr. H. W. Deane, opened the second Branch in this city, to be known as St. Joseph's Branch, No. 23, of the city of Ottawa. It is composed of French Canadians, among whom are the ex-mayor, and ex-M. P. P. St. Jean, M. D.; Alfred Garneau, son of the celebrated Canadian historian; Alphonse Benoit, Private Secretary to Hon. A. P. Caron, Minister of Militia; several clerks of the highest grade of the civil service; merchants and others; 22 charter members, all more or less influential and possessed of the energy and determination necessary to work up a fine and numerous Branch.

A petition for another Branch will most likely be completed in St. Anne's parish, Ottawa, on Sunday, Jan. 20th, 1884.

OBITUARY.

DECEASED OF AN OLD BYTONTIAN. Antoine Robillard, one of the oldest of Bytontians, passed over to the silent majority this morning, after a long and peaceable life in our midst, and at the ripe old age of eighty-seven years. Deceased came from St. Eustache, and settled here in 1827. His business was that of a contractor. Although not possessed of much education, he at different times carried on an extensive works here. Among the buildings which he erected were the Basilica, and the Water street convent. Deceased reared, with honor and credit to himself, a family of twelve children; nine of whom are living. Among his sons are the following widely known and respected gentlemen: Dr. Adolphe Robillard, health officer; Henry Robillard, M. P. P. for Russell County, and Alexander Robillard, who has occupied a number of prominent positions in the county. The deceased expired at the old homestead near the city on the Montreal road, and by the side of the deceased, as his spirit left this mundane sphere, stood the faithful life partner, who had sixty-five years, Mrs. Robillard, although aged eighty-one, is quite healthy.
