- No. 3.—A copy or copies of the several panels of Grand, Special, and Petit Jurors upon the opening of the first term of the Supreme Court, in the year 1834, together with the names of the Grand Jury sworn on that occasion.
- No. 4.—A copy of the Governor's Warrant appointing a High Sheriff, as required by Charter, on the first Monday of the year 1834, and a copy of the record of his being sworn into office.
