FUNERAL OF THE LATE C. H. BORDEN

Wolfville, May 1—The funeral service for the late C. H. Borden was held at his late residence on Sunday afternoon at three o'clock. Although the day was uncomfortably cold a large number of friends from Wolfville and other parts of the county gathered to participate in the last sad rites. Mr. Borden was a true man, and men of every class gathered at his grave, and no finer tribute to his worth could possibly have been given. The service was conducted by Rev. R. F. Dixon, rector of the Church of England, assisted by Rev. G. W. Miller, of the Presbyterian Church.

The members of the 219th Battalion stationed in Wolfville under command of Captain Cutten and Lieut. Noblett led the procession to the grave. Then followed the Oddfellows, clergymen, the funeral car, carriage with flowers, members of the family, and friends. It was the largest funeral procession ever seen in Wolfville. After the service at the church the Oddfellows gathered at the grave and conducted service, led by the Rev. Mr. England, Chaplain of the Orpheus Lodge. The pallbearers were E. S. Crawley, L. Harvey, Hugh Calkin, Capt. Salter, Geo. Munro, I. B. Oaks.

H. Waterbury and family, St. John.

Mr. Borden will be much missed, although he was only 55 years of age at the time of his death he had nevertheless been in business for a longer period of years than any other man now doing business in Wolfville. He took a deep interest in civic affairs and was an ideal man in his home. He has left to mourn a widow, who was a daughter of the late C. R. Burgess, two sons, Douglas and Robert, both of whom have enlisted in the 219th Battalion, and one daughter, Gertrude, who is at present a member of the Teaching Staff of Acadia Seminary, Wolfville.
