East Kent was a welcome caller at The Planet editorial rooms during a visit to the city this week. Mr. Jarvis is a resident of Harwich and in an interesting conversation, he gave some valuable facts concerning the prospects for the crops in the township in which he lives.

"The frost didn't do as much damage as was at first thought," said he, "but I cannot say that the outlook for many of the crops is very bright at present. The late potatoes will be affected more than any other crop, and the damage to them will be very great and a serious item to many of the farmers.

"Wheat, I think, will be a fair crop, although the aereage is quite small—much smaller than in previous years.

"Early barley has suffered to some extent, but it looks now as if it will turn out a very fair crop.
"Hay is a light crop, although what there is seems to be a good yield.
