Municipal Council.

The Municipal Council of Kings county met at the Court House, Kentville, on Tuesday, January 19th, at 10 a. m. All councillors were present. After reading of minutes, etc., a petition from residents of Ward 8 was read, asking that a proposed road to Wolfville Ridge be not allowed.

Couns. Reid, Hamilton and Donaldson all expressed the opinion that there was no interest of the public that would be served by the construction of the proposed road and, on motion, the report of the commission was not received.

Prof. A. B. Colwell was proposing a petition to lay out road in Ward 1, from Brown's Corner to New Road.

A petition for the arrangement of bounds of Districts 6 and 35 in Ward 10, attaching Conquest Road to the latter, was read. No action was taken.

Commissioner H. J. Nelly was granted an extension of time to January, 1911, to report on proposed road to Cloud Lake.

A petition asking that unused road in Ward 9 be closed, was read. Coun. Hamilton explained that the road was named and unnecessary, and that the land that it occupied was required to extend the cemetery. He moved that the prayer of petition be granted and the road closed in accordance with law. Motion carried.

The report of the County Health Officer was read and adopted.

Reports and accounts from Board of Health of Ward 13, were read. The report dealt mainly with the outbreak of diphtheria in South Berwick last winter, for services in connection whereof there were doctor's bills for \$105.

Mr. W. E. Roscoe read the law, showing that expenses incurred for the general good—in preventing the spread of the disease, etc.—were chargeable to the county and were a matter for adjustment of joint service between town and municipality. He proposed that a resolution be passed to the effect that the town should pay the expenses of the disease, caring for the sick and burying the dead, were chargeable to the parties, or, in case of their inability to pay were assessable upon the ward or district over which the Board of Health had control.

Coun. Parker referred to the which, some years ago, all of which were, without discrimination, made chargeable to the county as a whole. On motion of Coun. Illey, the matter was referred back to Finance Committee for a further report. This report was read at a later date and consisted of a recommendation that the sum of \$300 be allowed for doctor's attendance, etc., the same to be a charge upon the county.

The report on proposed road to run north from Old Post Road in South Berwick was referred to Committee on Roads and Bridges, which later reported, recommending that the proceedings be confirmed and road established as far as laid out. Report adopted.

Report of Trustees School Lands, Horton, was read and ordered filed. Receipts, 1909, expenses, \$152.32; \$147.14 divided among 26 school sections, giving \$5.65 to each.

The report of the Trustees Cornwallis School Lands was also read and adopted. Receipts, \$476.60.

Mr. C. C. H. Eaton, by permission, addressed Council in reference to the dog nuisance, showing the great injury wrought to the sheep raising industry and asking that Council take such action to mitigate the nuisance as was within its powers.

Coun. Illey spoke strongly, reiterating what Mr. Eaton had said and announcing his intention of making a business of fighting the dog nuisance. The Warden expressed the opinion that the most effective way would be to enact and enforce laws which would practically exterminate the nuisance.

Second day.
Council met at 10 a. m. on Wednesday 23rd. All present.

The reports of Overseers of Poor for the several townships were read and adopted. Overseers were reappointed.

Stewart Trenchholm, A. H. Patterson and Roy W. Woodman were appointed Trustees of public cemetery at Grand Pre.

Coun. Griffin moved that the appointment of a Board of Revision and Appeal be dispensed with for the present year. After some discussion the motion was withdrawn it being pointed out that the law only required the appointment of such a board once in three years.

Mr. W. E. Roscoe, solicitor, gave statement of the provisions of the assessment law. The law now in force in this county provides that two assessors annually. These shall assess the property in their respective wards at its full value. The duty of the Board of Revision, the appointment of which is compulsory once in three years, is to equalize the basis of valuation of the different wards.
