Paris, Dec. 26.—The aspirations of he Serbian Government for the future of its country were explained to the correspondent by Dr. Vesnitch, Serb an minister to France, who, in all probability, will be one of the Serbian elegates to the peace conference. Dr. Vesnitch was the head of the Serbian mission to the United States in 1917. Dr. Vesnitch said: "The Serbian people, composed of Croats, Slovenes and Serbians living within the boundaries of what hitherto has been called Serbia, and in the former Austro-Hungarian empire, number Medal for devotion to duty. about 15,000,000.
