

REPUBLICANS WIN SWEEPING VICTORY AT U.S. POLLS: ELECT PRESIDENT, CONTROL CONGRESS

In Absence of Official Figures, Senator Harding Seems Assured of 319 Votes in the Electoral College, 127 for Cox and 75 Doubtful—266 Votes Elects President So That if Cox Wins All Doubtful States He Can Not Be Elected—Republicans Control Congress—Democrats Lose Governors, State Legislatures and Other State and Local Candidates.

New York, Nov. 3.—One of the most sweeping Republican victories in history stood recorded today for Senator Harding for President and a Republican Congress, the pluralities being tremendous and unparalleled. With the Presidency and the Congress went the loss to the Democrats of Governors, State Legislatures, and other State and local candidates.

In the absence of final figures, Harding seems assured of 319 votes in the Electoral College as against 127 for Cox, with 75 doubtful votes. The Republican Congressional swing was as strong, with increased majorities in both Senate and House being market up.

The States for Harding. With but few final, or official returns, the indications are certain for the following votes in the Electoral College for Harding: California 13; Colorado 8; Connecticut 7; Delaware 3; Illinois 29; Indiana 15; Iowa 13; Kansas 10; Maine 6; Massachusetts 18; Michigan 15; Minnesota 12; Nebraska 8; New Hampshire 4; New Jersey 14; New York 45; Ohio 24; Oregon 5; Pennsylvania 38; Rhode Island 4; Utah 4; Vermont 4; Washington 7; West Virginia 8; Wisconsin 13; Wyoming 3; Total 329.

Cox Wins 11 States. Cox has the following safe States: Alabama 12; Arkansas 9; Florida 6; Georgia 14; Kentucky 13; Louisiana 10; Mississippi 10; North Carolina 12; South Carolina 9; Texas 20; Virginia 12; total 127, with 75 doubtful owing to the small returns so far.

Returns at Noon Today. New York, Nov. 3.—At noon, Eastern time, today the incoming Presidential returns had increased the gain for Harding. It appeared probable that in addition there would be added Idaho, Nevada, Missouri and Maryland. Cox's lead in the doubtful column showed a growing list to the Republican column.

Republican control of Congress for another two years, with an increase in House majority and prospective increase in the Senate, was the major part of the election sweep. A net gain of 25 votes in the House was shown with complete returns from only 17 states, but with most of the Democratic strongholds reporting.

Eight of fifteen Republican Senatorial candidates had come in winners today, seven others had substantial leads, while in ten other states all the Republican entrants were reported in the van.

Early Indications of Result. New York, Nov. 3.—The Republican claims that the Harding victory has become a landslide were given support by early returns from Western States. The first returns from Nebraska showed Harding leading Cox 2 to 1. In Wyoming the Republican candidate was leading 3 to 1. In Montana first returns were almost 2 to 1 for Harding.

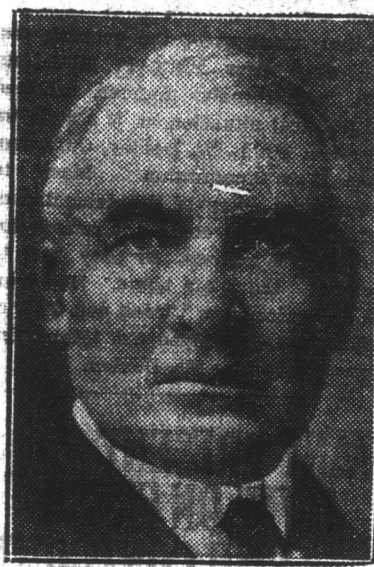
The first State outside the solid South that gave Cox an early lead was Kentucky, where, with more than one-third of the precincts reported, Cox was leading.

THREE DRY AREAS IN SCOTLAND IS AN EARLY REPORT

Airplanes Throw Out Leaflets—Large Number of Women Vote

London, Nov. 3.—Up to midnight three areas in Scotland in which voting took place yesterday on local option polled dry. Names Sanquhar, a rural constituency, and Kilsyth and Kirkintolock mining centres. Fourteen other sections voted for no change.

A Holiday Spirit. Glasgow, Nov. 3.—Although complete results of today's election question, whether Glasgow will be "dry" or "wet" will not be known until tomorrow noon, temperance forces tonight claim more than half the districts of this city voted against license. The walls of the cities are ablaze with colored posters expounding their claims of the rival parties. Automobiles are crammed with cheering voters and a holiday spirit is in evidence.

All districts were visited today by airplanes from which leaflets were thrown. Women were out in force, many voting contrary to their husbands. All sixteen hundred saloons of the city were closed. Good humor prevailed but lively scenes were witnessed in many booths.

WIDE RANGE OF PRICES FOR EGGS STRICTLY FRESH

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 3.—Eggs labelled "strictly fresh" range in price in Toronto today at from 75 cents to \$1.25. In the majority of cases between eighty cents and a dollar a dozen is asked.

LYNCH NEGRO WHO KILLED MEN AFTER REFUSED BALLOT

Orlando, Florida, Nov. 3.—A negro named Perry, who shot and killed two men at Ocoee after he had been refused a vote, was lynched early today outside the corporate limits of Orlando.

ZAYAS APPEARS LIKELY TO BE CHOICE OF CUBANS FOR NEXT PRESIDENT

Havana, Cuba, Nov. 3.—Alfredo Zayas, Coalition candidate for President, has carried five of the six provinces over Jose Miguel Gomez, Liberal, according to the Government Department of Communications. Zayas' lead, based on returns from about a third of the precincts, is estimated at 4,000.

The only official figures made public by the Electoral Board were from the provinces of Oriente and Pinar Del Rio, which, virtually complete, gave Zayas a majority of 8,416. The Board adjourned after refusing to indicate what the count showed in other provinces.

Incomplete Government figures: Gomez carried Havana by 7,235.

FEW CABINET MINISTERS REMAIN IN OTTAWA

Ottawa, Oct. 3.—With the departure for Geneva on Tuesday of Sir George Foster and Hon. C. J. Doherty, the Canadian administration is left with a bare quorum for Cabinet council. The Premier and Hon. J. A. Calder are touring the West. Sir Henry Drayton and his Tariff Commission have left for the Eastern portion of their inquiry, and there are left at Ottawa Sir James Loughheed, who will be acting premier, and Hon. Messrs. Ballantyne, Blondin, Sifton, Wigmore and McCurdy. Hon. Hugh Guthrie, who was but a fitful visitor at the capital, and who is scarcely yet acquainted with the staff of the Militia Department, of which he is the head, is expected back shortly, but not for long, since he will immediately take part in the Elgin election campaign now raging.

DO NOT ADMIT EXISTENCE OF PRICE FIXING

Wholesale Grocers' Association Present Statement of Defence in Toronto

ENDORSE PRICE FIXING
By Manufacturers—Say This is Most Economical Method for Community

Toronto, Nov. 3.—The Wholesale Grocers' Association, of Toronto, has delivered its statement of defence to W. Roebuck, representing the Attorney General. The statement pleads that the Board of Commerce has already decided in their favor and deny all allegations of conspiracy, illegal combination or other wrongful acts, as alleged by the Attorney General's statement of claim. They do not admit the existence of price fixing.

They deny having acted upon any policy of restricting the wholesale grocery trade of the province to those who are in membership of the association, or of fixing any non-competitive prices.

They say that a manufacturer who avails himself of the benefits of their organization, of warehouses and selling staff should not operate unfairly by selling in individual instances to the retail trade or to brokers selling to the trade. They claim the right to protect themselves against manufacturers in part and at the same time in competition with it sell direct to preferred members of the retail trade or brokers.

They endorse price fixing by saying that the principle of having the manufacturer fix the price at which his goods shall be sold and adhere to it is the proper and most economical and desirable method and in the interest of the community.

STRONG BRITISH FEELING AGAINST CATTLE EMBARGO

Disease Among Canadian Cattle Is Not the Reason for Embargo

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—Dr. A. H. Grisdale, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, stated Tuesday night that he had read with much interest and with much pleasure an editorial in a Montreal paper Tuesday on the Canadian cattle embargo. He said: "This editorial summarizes the situation exceedingly well, and not only epitomizes the history of the embargo, extending as it does over the last thirty years, but it seems to me to put the present status of the affair in a nutshell, when it declares that it is a case of pure protection not for one class merely, but for one part of one class as against all the rest of the population of the British Isles. This, of course, is quite legitimate, if the British consumer wishes to stand for it, but what does not seem fair to us is for the Secretary of Agriculture to again bring up the accusation of ill-health in Canadian herds, as he does when he states that it is still necessary to maintain this embargo for the protection of the British flocks and herds against insidious diseases that might possibly come from Canada."

Embargo Losing Popularity. "We are quite closely in touch with what is happening on the other side in connection with this embargo and feel that there is a strong sentiment spreading fairly rapidly through the most consuming class against the importation of Canadian stockers into the British market for fattening on the British pastures or in the British feed yards. Official representations have been under way for some days to the British authorities as it has been felt that the time was opportune for some extra effort in view of the social and economic situations in Great Britain and Ireland, and although practically continuous efforts have been made for the last six years to us to have this most undesirable condition remedied, it was felt that little special effort at this time had much to recommend it."

RIDER LEFT WHEEL AND VANISHED WHEN HE KNOCKED MAN DOWN. While Dave Bancur, of 258 First Street North, was walking home Wednesday night a bicycle and rider suddenly appeared out of the darkness and crashed into him. The collision knocked him to the ground, injuring his chest and cutting two fingers. The young fellow riding the wheel did not stop to ask concerning the damages but disappeared into the night, leaving his wheel behind. Bancur took the wheel and handed it over to the police. The owner of the wheel did not have a light on it, and he will probably be prosecuted. The license number of the wheel was issued to Paul Katchmar.

PRESS DELEGATES TELL OF CANADIAN DESIRE FOR UNBIASED REPORTS

London, Nov. 3.—Much that was complimentary to Canada's hospitality was said at the luncheon Tuesday by the Empire Press Union to Lord Burnham, President Imperial Press conference, which toured Canada recently.

Lord Burnham also said that Canada wanted British news in Canadian papers from the British viewpoint, and that the British wanted almost as much Canadian news in the British press from the Canadian viewpoint.

GOVERNMENT TO GIVE EXHIBITION FINANCIAL HELP

Plan to Guarantee British Empire Exhibition \$600,000 in 1923

London, Nov. 3.—When the bill authorizing the Government to guarantee £100,000 towards the expenses of the British Empire Exhibition to be held in 1923 was read a second time in the House of Commons on Tuesday, some opposition was expressed on the ground that the country cannot afford such outlays at the present time, no matter how good the object may be.

Hon. J. A. Clynnes, the Labor leader, however, supported the measure because it allowed Parliament the opportunity to do a great amount of good in promoting the internal trade of the Empire. One member asserted that the dominions were not putting up a single penny, asked why England should put up money to develop the trade of the dominions. However, the second reading carried by a vote of 205 to 30.

MOTOR TRUCK CRUSHES HEAD OF CHILD WHO WAS PLAYING UNDERNEATH

Winnipeg, Nov. 3.—Jack, the 5-year-old son of Knud Schioler, contractor and engineer, died from the effects of injuries received when he was crushed beneath an auto truck in the vicinity of his home yesterday afternoon.

The truck, which was one of the J. H. Ashdown Company's, was driven by E. R. Maitland. It had been standing for a short time in the vicinity, and when the driver returned and moved it forward, the child, unknown to him, was beneath it, and one of the wheels of the vehicle passed over his head, death being instantaneous. Maitland is held by St. James police pending the official inquiry.

Dr. McConnery, Provincial Coroner, has ordered a post mortem examination, and this was held by Dr. Gordon Bell. An inquest will follow, but the date of the inquiry has not been set.

ELTON VOTERS DEFEAT GOOD ROADS BYLAW

Large Majority Against Building 95 Miles of Road at a Cost of \$143,750

CONDITION MONEY MARKET
Given as Reason for Defeat of Project—339 Voters Went to Polls

The Good Roads by-law voted upon by ratepayers of the Municipality of Elton on Tuesday was defeated by a majority of 227, the vote being 283 no and 56 yes. The weather being favorable, about fifty-five per cent. of the ratepayers visited the polls, a total of 339 votes being cast.

It was proposed to build ninety-five miles of road at a cost of \$143,750 and it was upon this that the people voted. The general feeling in the municipality seemed to favor good roads but objection was made to the proposition at the present time owing to the condition of the money market. The result of the election by wards was as follows: Ward 1, six yes, fifty-nine no. Ward 2, nine yes, forty-eight no. Ward 3, eighteen yes, thirty-six no. Ward 4, three yes, forty-nine no. Ward 5, seven yes, fifty-four no. Ward 6, thirteen yes, thirty-seven no.

During the past Summer the good roads work in Cornwallis Municipality has progressed favorably and the first part of the program of good roads, which will take three years to complete and will cost \$100,000 is now well under way. Splendid progress has also been made on the good roads work in Woodnorth Municipality.

Owing to the fact that their assessment was not high enough to allow debentures to be issued to cover the cost—\$107,000—of the good roads program planned by the engineer, the good roads work in Whitehead Municipality was postponed until next year, when it is planned to build about ninety-two and a half miles of road. When this is finished the Brandon-Virden highway will be practically completed.

ALBERTA DRYS HAVE A MAJORITY OF 15,000

Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 3.—Estimates based on the official returns in circumstances where the declaration took place Wednesday on the prohibition vote and on the totals already received in the other ridings, where the counts were adjourned, show the majority for the drys in Alberta to be now slightly over 15,000. The figures have been compiled by H. H. Hull, provincial organizer for the dry forces, and he asserts that the dry returns will show considerably over 20,000 majority.

REPUBLICANS WILL HAVE GAIN OF 8 SEATS IN SENATE

This May Be Further Increased When Final Returns Are in

WILL CONTROL SENATE

Result Gives Republicans Big Majority—Some Doubtful Seats

Washington, Nov. 3.—A net Republican gain of "eight and possibly ten" seats in the senate was claimed late tonight by the Republican senatorial committee on the basis of "early reports" from the senatorial fights. Victories were claimed in South Dakota, Idaho, Maryland, California, Nevada, Oklahoma, Arizona and Colorado.

"Should the actual results bear out the early indications, giving the Republicans a gain of eight seats," said the committee's statement, "they will have at the next session 57 seats to the Democrats' 39, a majority of 18. Should they win all ten seats they will have a majority of 22."

Republicans Will Control: New York, Nov. 2.—The Republicans will control the next senate, according to returns received at midnight. In addition to 34 holdover Republican senators, the Republicans have won 12 seats, giving them a total of 46 seats at this hour of over 45 seats. At the same time the Democrats had won ten seats in addition to their 28 holdovers—a total of 38.

With twelve seats still undecided, the Republicans required but three more to give them a majority in the senate. Several of the seats yet undecided were considered almost certain for the Republicans.

W. Beckham; Louisiana, Edwin Broussard; North Carolina, Lee S. Overman; South Carolina, Ellison D. Smith; Virginia, Carter Glass.
