KILLED AT YPRES

Rwegan, April 27.—Lieut. Col. Percival Birchall of the Canadian permanent staff, whose name appears in the list issued by the militia department as having been killed, in the fighting at Ypres, was well known in Western Canada.

In February of 1913 he made a tour of the west having been loaned to the Canadian militia department by the British authorities.

While in the west Lieut.-Col. Birchall was in charge of military instruction classes at Winnipeg, Brandon, Regina and other Western points.

WOMEN DELEGATES ARRIVE.

The Hague, April 27, via London.—Forty-two delegates from the United States to the International Women's Peace Congress, who had been held up on the steamer Noordam because of Great Britain's order stopping traffic to Holland, arrived here today.

FORTS HEAVILY DAMAGED

London, April 28.—The Daily Mail's Athens correspondent, telegraphing Monday, says: "The bombardment of the interior forts of the Dardanelles, which began Sunday, continued today and resulted in heavy damage to the forts. It is reported that the forts on the coast near Smyrna also were bombarded, but this report has not been confirmed."

FURTHER CANADIAN LOSSES REPORTED

Ottawa, April 27.—The militia department this evening received an additional list of 29 officers and wounded in the big fight near Ypres. The despatch also contains the announcement that thirty-two Canadians have been made prisoners of war. It is not known whether these are all the missing. While there may be more Canadians missing, the cable would appear to indicate that the German report that one thousand Canadians have been captured is an exaggeration. The list received tonight includes six killed and twenty-three wounded.
