MANY HAPPY RETURNS

Today is the fifty-fifth anniversary of the birth of our Sovereign, His Most Gracious Majesty, George the Fifth, and Nanaimo, in common with all other loyal cities in the vast domain known as the British Empire, is keeping holiday in his honor.

Since His Majesty came to the throne in 1910, the Empire has passed through the throes of the most momentous struggle with which any country was ever faced, and it is not too much to say that much of the credit for the victory which British arms helped so signally to win, was due to the never failing interest which the King and his Gracious Consort, at all times took, not only in the army and navy as a whole, but in the individuals who composed those magnificent services. His Majesty made more than one visit to the battlefields of Europe, while his visits to the various hospitals and convalescent homes in England, where our wounded soldiers and sailors were receiving treatment, were of almost daily occurrence. And in this proof of his interest he was loyal and continually backed up by Her Majesty, the Queen.

We trust that every person in Nanaimo who is possessed of a flag or piece of bunting will fling it to the breeze today, for Nanaimo should be gay with bunting in honor of the occasion, and though toasting has gone out of fashion, we trust also that every one of us will remember to breathe at least the silent prayer, "The King, God Bless Him."

A SERIOUS SITUATION.

Notwithstanding the fact that more newspaper is being manufactured in Canada today than at any other time in the history of the country, The Herald is informed that twenty-six daily Canadian newspapers or twenty-five per cent. of the total daily publications in the Dominion are facing suspension owing

to their inability to obtain an assurance of newsprint supply at the current contract export price.

The matter is now under consideration by the Government, which may be forced to adopt far-reaching and perhaps unprecedented measures to meet an extremely serious situation. If so large a proportion of Canadian newspapers had to cease publication because they could not obtain an assurance of supply of paper at the current price from mills operating in Canada under Canadian franchises and using Canadian raw material and Canadian power, owing to the export of their product to the United States, it would mean simply that in this respect the Dominion was in a position of economic bondage to our neighbors south of the line.

It would be outrageous if a solitary Canadian paper, no matter how small, had to cease publication because it could obtain no newsprint although it was willing to pay the current export price for it, while Canadian paper was being used in the production of, for example, the Hearst gutter press with its foul libels upon this Empire.

Admittedly the problem is a difficult one, since there is a world shortage of newsprint due to the growing depletion of pulp timber combined with unlicensed extravagance in the use of paper during the last few years, especially in the United States where the metropolitan newspapers appeared, and still appear, to have the idea that they must produce editions as large as a Hudson's Bay Company blanket to discharge properly their legitimate functions. At Washington recently it was stated that the amount of newsprint which was imported and produced at home last year fell short of the demand by 63,000 tons, but it is of interest to note that in 1919 the United States exported 110,295 tons of it. In any case, however the problem is going to be dealt with. It should go without saying that the Canadian market should have the preference in respect of the supply of newsprint manufactured from Canadian raw material under Canadian franchises.

BIG FOOTBALL GAME SATURDAY

Nanaimites will be able to witness a real junior football game on Saturday next. The Province team was defeated by the Nanaimo team here on that day and are bringing their strongest team to try and down the locals. The local team, which was chosen from the two all-star teams which played on Friday evening, will be the best which Nanaimo could choose to represent it in the coming game. The following quoted from the Vancouver Province will give a correct impression of the strength of the visiting teams. When we broke into the Vancouver junior league it had been in operation for about a month, and at first had great difficulty in getting together a winning combination and as a result they dropped their first three games. They then succeeded in signing on the two or three men that they needed to round out a real football machine, and from the fourth game of the season on to the last game of the season they won every point, save one which they lost by being tied by St. Mark's. The handicap they thus started on by losing these six points was a big one and events proved that the winning of all the points remaining was necessary, as the championship came to them by a slim margin of one point. The forward line proved tricky, fast with fine scoring power as their total of forty-three goals scored will testify. They scored on the average of nearly four goals a game. Reed, the vice-captain, an aggressive centre forward, showed himself to be a very difficult man to stop when he started his march goalwards, and he scored fourteen points. Ingoldsby also proved he knew where the goal was on many occasions. The wingers, McLean and Green, were fast and good feeders for their centre men. Donkin at inside right, was perhaps the trickiest and most valuable forward in the league. The defence was very strong and were beaten but eight times, an average of less than a goal a game. Parkin and Barker in goal, were the right men on the job in more than one game. Mahon, Dagger and Nelles at the full back positions, displayed fine headwork and proved stone-walls. The half backs, Hatt, Hale, McCarthy and Captain Buckley, were a fine combination on both defence and offence and took care of their hard positions in great style. It is expected that this squad will remain intact until senior company is reached. They are due to play the champions of the Junior League of Nanaimo in the Coal City next Saturday.

GOVT. MAJORITY OF TWENTY SIX

The Fielding Amendment to the Budget Speech Was Defeated After an All-Night Session by 120 Votes to 94.

Ottawa, June 2.—Canadian Press. By 120 votes to 94, the Fielding Amendment to the Budget speech was defeated in the Commons at 5.30 this morning. The House had waited throughout the night and the early morning hours for the result of the vote, and when the division bells rang there was a general flocking of members to the chamber. When the vote was announced cheers arose from the Government benches. The Government majority on the vote was 26.

H. O. Wright, Battleford, and J. A. Campbell, Nelson, Man., former Government supporters, voted for the Fielding amendment, and W. A. Buchanan, Lethbridge, who had announced his intention of opposing the Government's tariff proposals, was not in the chamber when the vote was taken, but was paired with Dr. J. W. Edwards, Frontenac.

Not only the members of the House, but also many visitors who came to the galleries early Tuesday evening to hear the debate, remained to get first hand information on the result of the division. Nearly a score of ladies who had occupied seats in the members' gallery during the whole evening session, remained for the taking of the vote.

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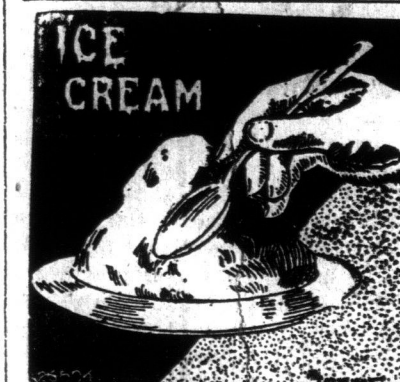
