Ten years ago George Teeter's father met with an ac-cident at the crossing, which later caus-ed his death. Three years ago three people were killed on the same spot. Miss Hainer, Miss Hughes and a boy. They were standing on the crossing waiting for the express, and failed to note the approach of a freight. The night was cold and the crossing clear last night, and the only explana-tion of the accident is that Wilson had his ears muffled against the cold, and did not hear the signals of danger.






