## WEEKLY REVIEW OF TORONTO WHOLE-

SALE MARKETS WEDNESDAY, Aug. 14. PRODUCE. The market has been very firm during the week the supply of flour and all kinds of grain falling far short of the demand, and prices have consequently advanced. Wheat has been very firm, but transactions have been chiefly confined to local millers. 24,027 bushels; oats, 15,510 bushels; batter, 54,248 bushels; peas are bushels; yand corn nil bush. Outside markets are ver firm, with a slight improvement on last quotation with moderate arrivals at ports of call the float quotable change in values. The demand for the Continent still continues and helps to support prices. With the exception of a few thunderstorms the weather has continued fine and the temperatur high. Continental advices state that with the exception of a few showers the weather in France durtinuation of harvest where already commenced, and also for the maturation of the cereal crops in the late districts.
