WATCH ON CITY'S MILK

No Half-Measures When Inspectors Find Dangerous Practice

"Dump that milk out!"

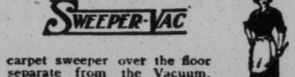
"Don't argue. Out with it!" And out it went, right into the sewer—a canful of the cleanest-looking milk that ever came to the dairy—all because the farmer had stopped a leak in the can by rubbing soap over it. Toronto's milk inspectors object to soap when served in that connection. The farmer was the loser.

This is only one illustration of the precautions taken and the penalties imposed by the Department of Public Health to ensure a pure milk supply for a big city. From dairy farm to doorstep the milk is subject to official supervision and control; and the man who would "slip something across" on the department needs to be smart, not a politician. Not even the wicked little disease germs can get through any more; they are cooked to death in the pasteurizing plants.

Even before the milk leaves the cow the department has something to say about it. Twice a year, under the authority of the Ontario Milk Act of 1911, its veterinary inspectors—there are four of them—visit the dairy farms supplying Toronto. They test the herds for tuberculosis; inspect the general cleanliness or otherwise of herds, stables, milking utensils, and the milkers themselves; point out, sometimes enforce, necessary improvements; and report to the laboratories in Toronto. In the laboratories a card index record of every farm is kept, on which is noted the condition of that farm at each inspection. If it fails to conform to the standard its milk supply is excluded from the city.
