The loan bill passed the lower house of the Newfoundland Legislature on Thursday the 13th despite the efforts of the opposition, who contended that the interests of the depositors in the government savings bank were being sacrificed for the benefit of non-investors abroad. The bill provides for floating \$2,500,000 at four per cent. interest by forty year bonds and guarantees that the whole public debt, which, inclusive of this amount, makes \$12,000,000, and of the sinking fund, which is established in connection with this loan, shall become a first lien upon the revenue of the colony. The savings bank depositors have always had preferential claim, but now it is proposed to place the guarantee to bond holders before the obligations to depositors. A motion that the savings bank be placed upon equal terms with these preferential claims was defeated by the government, which argued that the position of savings bank depositors is now better than before, because of the added stability of the colony's credit.
