THURSDAY MORNING.

Last night will not be forgotten by thousands for a long time to come. In the early part of the evening there was a magnificent torch-light procession, paid for, I learn, out of the \$2000 voted by government to receive the delegates from the Eastern Provinces. As the firemen marched along Richmond and Dundas streets headed by a band and firing of rockets, which lighted up their course for a mile, the scene was a most splendid one. The streets were absolutely packed with surging masses of people. The smashing of crinolines and bonnet firm's was something awful. I was fortunate in being able to park my way through the rocking mass by following in the wake of a waggish city alderman who shouted every other moment, "I am over the top" and was allowed plenty of elbow room in consequence. Having been favored with a ticket to the Grand Ball, I went, as a matter of business, with a few friends, into the gallery from which a good view could be obtained of the brilliant affair. The city hall was splendidly fitted up for the occasion, the music being supplied by the band of the 16th regt. The company assembled was somewhat select (tickets \$5.00) and the hall was not crowded to excess. There was the customary display of gorgeous dresses and naked shoulders, and conspicuous amongst the male persuasion, young and old, some of the latter had headed veterans who bobbed around quite vigorously to the great amusement of the holders. I noticed a few Goderich ladies and gentlemen on the floor. In the gallery I observed an old chap from the country, who, with his daughter, looked on for a few minutes and went fast asleep, and, I am told, slept there all night. Indefatigable reporters who sat the performance through, say that after supper several gentlemen fell with their partners in the whirl, inflicting much damage to ribbons, crinolines, waterfalls, &c. It would be libellous, of course, to say that champagne had anything to do with these catastrophes. On leaving the hall I found the streets much quieter. Side showmen having bowed themselves hoarse had resorted to rest and pulmonary wafers, and had gone to their beds, and many an unfortunate's weight rested from one hot to another in search of a bed. Entering Ramey's with a friend who wished to see if his bed was all right, "which it wasn't all right," I witnessed a most laughable scene. In the parlor every chair was taken up with a third sleeper, male or female, two young men were sleeping on the centre-table, four more "heads and throats" on the sofa, and in the dining room a lot were mooring with out even a feather under their heads. As I left the blinking porter was conducting my friend to a straw shake-down at the top of the building.

To return to the fair proper before concluding this letter I may say that the show ground has been crowded to excess all day, and a walk through the Crystal Palace has been almost an impossibility. I spent a portion of the day amongst the stock, and have been delighted. The show of Durhams is almost complete—Christie, from Paris, will take more than one prize. I have never seen anything to equal some cows he shows in this class. The Herefords and Durhams are well represented; but the Ayrshires appear to me to make the worst appearance they have done in ten previous exhibitions. 'Tis a pity more attention is not paid to this excellent class of milk animals. There are some noble Sheep on the ground—Cotswolds nearly 400 weight—Leicester that will shear from 20 to 25 lbs of wool—Merinos with so fine a coat you can scarcely see it—Shropshire Downs, and South-Downs, of almost complete symmetry—and Cheviots that gladden the heart of many an old Scotch herd to look at.

I am not much of a judge of pork till it is cooked, but I imagine there is a marked improvement on former years.—Grumpy is here in all his varied breeds and shapes; from the 1200 weight Yorkshire boar, to the trim Berkshire of a 100.

I have not seen the turn-out of Horses, but I fear that it is fully up to not ahead of former years. I was much pleased to see Mr. Fisher, from Colborne, leading his "Hard Fortunes." This horse is well improved as I saw him last. He is sporting a first-class ticket on his forehead, and seems to be proud of the honor he brings to Huron—the first prize for the best Agricultural Stallion.

Huron is not represented as she ought to be in the way of stock. I have, so far, only noticed the Galloway, "Black Douglas," lately owned by Geo. Anderson, a Galloway cow by George Anderson, and a splendid Leicester Ram by Jas. Houston, of Hay.

The first prize for Fall Wheat goes to J. O. Sullivan, Seymour, Patrick Carol, of Colborne, takes the second for club spring wheat, the first for oats, and the second for peas. The general opinion is that the first prize Fall Wheat has been trifled with somehow—it is too white and smells strongly of sulphur.

Wm. Elliott (English) of Goderich takes the 3rd prize for spring wheat of any other variety, and Mr. Gibbons takes in second for Belgian carrots, although I notice that in the printed list it is marked third. Mr. J. McDonogh comes in 3rd best for a Galloway calf under one year old. Mr. John Stewart, of Ben Millar, is awarded the 3rd prize for the best 20 varieties apples. Mr. Jno. Gray of Egmondville shows the best double mould plough, and R. Ruciman the 2nd best two-horse cultivator. In the fine art department Mr. Creswell takes two first and one second prize in oil painting, and a 3rd and two second prizes for water colors. I am glad to hear that Mr. C.'s pictures are being eagerly bought up by lovers of art. These, I think, are all the prizes taken by Huron and Bruce, and I

must say that, considering the limited number of articles brought down, we have reason to be proud of our section. All we want another year in more public spirit and it will be seen that our present success will be largely increased.

FRIDAY, 22nd.
In my last letter I omitted to mention that the party of English capitalists now in America were received and entertained at the G. W. station here at one o'clock yesterday by the officials of the road and a number of prominent Londoners at an elegant little dejeuner. The men of money, amongst whom was Sir Morton Peto, ate the good things and drunk champagne as if they had been accustomed to good things for some time past. Looking at the scene and taking notes in my little volume of human nature I could not help thinking that the possession of an income of half a million sterling or so materially increases the chances of one's being noticed!

The banquet last night in honor of the Maritime delegates was to have been the grand affair of the week, but it was as near being a failure as possible. The large drill shed was ornamented for the occasion at an expense I am told of some \$700 (a Goderich painter would have been glad of the job at \$0.0) and tables were set for 300 guests. The number present was about 150, including the guests and representatives of the press. The secret of the failure in point of numbers must be attributed to the price charged for the tickets, \$4.50, for I know that a large number would have been present had the entrance fee been at all reasonable. The dinner was not bad, but the waiters were evidently green at their business, for without taking memoranda it would have been difficult for some of the guests to tell what they had had, so great was the interval between the soup and the fish, and so on down to the entrees. An abundance of champagne, however, was placed upon the tables, and most of the guests seemed perfectly willing to while away said intervals by tasting its virtues and their own capacity. The speaking was poor, excepting a very fair address from the Hon. Wm. M'Dougall, who apologized for the non-appearance of Messrs. Brown and M'Ge. The hon. gentlemen from the maritime provinces spoke highly of the fair, and of this western country which they had now seen for the first time, and all declared themselves in favor of Confederation. We are sorry to have to say that some of the hon. and learned gentlemen gave evidence by their mental confusion, thickened utterance and weakness of knee, that the champagne was just a little heady. Mayor Glass filled the chair very creditably, and the fine band of the 16th regiment gave us some excellent music during the evening. The dinner party broke up about one o'clock, and the weary reporters wound their ways to city sanctuaries or the telegraph office to see that their reports were properly dispatched for next morning's papers.

SATURDAY MORNING.
The city in being deserted fast. Trains last night and early this morning have taken away thousands of visitors—others are following—Lestis has taken off his glasses, the big woman has been hidden away, the lady of 300 summers has disappeared, the philanthropist has given away his last cent, the apple stands are empty, no one now invites you to partake of meals at only 50 cts., the worm doctor has "dried up," the big chouse has been started on its homeward trip, cattle are being hurried off, reporters have gladly closed their note books, and in fact a few hours will see London "as it were."
At a pretty full meeting of the Agricultural Association yesterday Mr. McGillivray was elected President for the ensuing year, and it was unanimously agreed that the next Exhibition should be held in the city of Toronto. The decision of some of the judges was sharply criticised, but I did not discover that anything came out of it beyond a wordy warfare. The rest of the proceedings are devoid of public interest.
The weather throughout has been all that the heart of man could wish, and notwithstanding the immense crowd of people, there has not been a single serious accident to mar the pleasure of those visiting the exhibition. There was remarkably little drinking or rowdiness, and under the care of the most efficient chief of police, Mr. Richard Wigmore, and his fine force of "regulars," assisted by a number of "specials," the peace and good order of the city has been unbroken. Notwithstanding the alleged arrival of swarms of pick-pockets, I have not heard of a single theft beyond the stealing of a horse on Thursday night. These facts are notable, and speak well for Londoners as well as the vast concourse of visitors.
The following is a correct statement of the number of visitors each day, as shown by the number of tickets sold, although a considerable addition must be counted on for dead heads:—

Members and visitors, about 5,000
Total..... 50,000!
Being in excess of any previous year of between 4,000 and 5,000.

A GREAT CEREAL.—One of the principal features of the New York State Fair was a mammoth cheese, made by Smith & Son, of Gorwich, Oxford Co., C. W. Its weight was 4,340 lbs., and it took the milk from 500 cows for four days for its production. It measured sixteen feet in circumference, five feet in diameter, and two feet four inches high. The cheese was taken to the London Exhibition, of which it formed an attractive feature.

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
