—The Ladies' Aid of the City Hospital will meet on Monday at 2.30 p.m. in All Saints school room.

—Rev. Dr. William Moore, secretary and lecturer of the Canadian association for the prevention of consumption and other forms of tuberculosis, will lecture on the Cause and Prevention of Consumption in the Norway block, Saturday, Oct. 6th.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West.

Homestead Regulations. Any one numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest is available for homestead to any person, the sole head of a family, or over 18 years of age, who is the applicant of one quarter section, or 16 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made by the person or the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.

Application for entry or inspection must be made personally at the local office of the Agent or Sub-Agent, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing, and not liable to cancellation, may be subject to the approval of the department, relinquish it in favor of his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or any other person.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled, or voluntarily abandoned, subsequent to the date of abandonment, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in what particular the homesteader is in default, and it subsequently becomes known that the homesteader is in default, the applicant will be notified to show any prior right of re-entry, should the homesteader be found to be in default, and if it is found that the homesteader has been granted it may be summarily cancelled.

Lotting—A settler is required to perform the conditions under the following rules: (1) At least six months' residence on the land during the term of the year during the term of the year.

(2) If the settler is absent, he must file a statement of absence on the land during the term of the year.

(3) If the settler has no permanent residence in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements may be satisfied by residing on the homestead for a certain period during the term of the year.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the agent for the Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WESTERN MINING REGULATIONS. Coal—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal, and \$9 for anthracite. Not more than 100 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton, and no payment shall be collected on the gross output.

Quartz—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$50 per acre for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital.

A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,000 x 1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon making a survey map, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of the royalty of 2 1/2 per cent on the sales.

Placer mining claims generally are for 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

A free miner may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, payable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river lease. Royalty at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
