burners as this enlarges them and
leads to an increased use of gas.

Wash bars with hot soda water.
Wipe them with blacklead, un-
less they are of steel, when they
be cleaned with emery paper.

Clean the brass taps and fittings.
Scrape and wash the shelves with
soda and water.

Replace all the parts.

Moscow, July 15.—A terrible tra-
gedy is reported from the village of
Poboyanka, in the Akkman district.
Five children who were playing at
home, in the absence of their parents,
climbed into a big iron safe with a
massive lid, held up by a prop of
wood. One of the children must

have accidentally knocked the prop
away, for the lid fell and owing to
the automatic catch became immov-
able from the inside.
The parents, on the return, were
alarmed at the disappearance of the
children and searched for them in
every place, but in vain.

It was only after a long delay that
they thought of the safe. When they
opened it they found the dead bodies
of the children, their little faces dis-
torted by their sufferings. All had
been suffocated.

Faithful Dog Brings Relief.

Man Gored by Bull May Die of In-
juries.

Weathersfield, Vt., July 13.—Led
by the peculiar actions of a pet house
dog to follow it two miles through
the fields, the family of Myron Eaton
came upon his mangled body lying
in the brush of a bull pasture late
last night.

It was late to-day before Mr. Eaton
was able to give any intimation as to
what had happened to him, although
it was apparent that he had been gored
by a bull. Mr. Eaton said he was
attacked by the bull as he went into
the pasture late in the afternoon.

He was trampled upon and tossed
into the air repeatedly until finally
he landed in the bushes out of reach
of the infuriated animal.

The dog, which had accompanied
him, accompanied home and succeeded
in enticing the family back to the
scene.

Mr. Eaton, who is 35 years old,
has several ribs broken and his
lungs were punctured by the bull's
horns. There is little hope of his
recovery.

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 17.—Lo-
cal physicians have been unable to
diagnose the case of W. H. Shaw, a
tourist from Carrollton, Ga., who yes-
terday entered the Cave of the Winds
in full possession of his faculties and
emerged with his memory gone and
his mind a blank. He is a patient at
the Memorial Hospital.

I have made a large cheesecloth
