## Mild. Auxiliary Bible Society.

The annual collection in aid of the Newfoundland Auxiliary Bible Society will be taken up in the course of the next week by lady collectors who have kindly consented to wait upon the friends of the Society according to the new arrangement authorized at the last annual meeting. The Committee hope that the collectors will meet with a generous response, especially in view of the greater need of the Parent Society caused by the war. Also every Protestant Volunteer throughout the Empire including our Newfoundland boys has been presented with a Testament before starting for the seat of war. Amid the many calls perhaps there is none that has a stronger claim on our sympathy and support than this great work of the Bible Society.

New Moon—15th.

STORMING of CIUDAD RODRIGO, 1812. A town in Spain to which Wellington lay siege and took after eleven days fighting. It was gallantly defended and the English lost over 5,000 men. Wellington was created Duke of Ciudad Rodrigo as a reward for this achievement.

ADEN captured 1839. The strongly-fortified port on the S. E. Coast of Arabia, which was occupied by the Portuguese and the Turks until captured by the British on this date.

## War Notes.

Mr. J. Ramsey MacDonald, member of Parliament and chief of the Labour Party, has gone to the front with an ambulance corps. He was for a time bitterly opposed to the war.

During last August 1,571 naturalizations took place in Australia. These included 1,093 Germans and 128 Austrians.

American-made siege guns and projectiles are to be used by the Russians soon. The guns were made in Pennsylvania and weighed 105 tons each. Orders for 125,000 tons of barbed wire and plain wire from the belligerent nations will keep the mills at Pittsburgh going for several months.

The Trade Bureau in Philadelphia has received an inquiry for a lot of five hundred thousand pick axes from the French Government.

Owing to the failure of the crops in Sweden, Russia will permit the export to Sweden of alimentary products, oats, flour, eggs and barley, sufficient for one year's consumption, on condition that Sweden pledges herself not to allow the export of these products to the States at war with Russia.

As the Minister of Marine could not promise that the French fishermen would be released from service by the end of February, the fleet which usually equips during December for Newfoundland will not sail as early as usual.

## MOST AUDACIOUS LIE YET.

The "Novoe Vremya" of Petrograd, learns that the Gazeta Czenstochowa, published by the Germans at Czenstochowa, inserts the following proclamation by the Kaiser:

"Poles, you of course remember how once at night the bell of the Holy Swiatogorsky Monastery began to ring without human aid, when all pious persons understood that a great and important event had been signalled by a miracle. The event was my decision to wage war with Russia and to restore to Poland her saints and to annex her most cultured land to Germany."

"That a wondrous dream. To me appeared the Virgin and commanded me to save her holy convent, which danger had threatened. She gazed at me with tears. I proceeded to follow her divine behest."

"Know of this, Poles, and meet my troops like brothers and saviours. Know, Poles, that those who are with me will be liberally rewarded, and those against me will perish. With me are God and the Holy Virgin. She lifted the sword of Germany to succour Poland."

## Britain's Man-Power.

Mr. J. A. Spender, the Editor of the Westminster Gazette, gives this authoritative statement as to how Britain stands for Man-power at this moment.

"The coast-raid will help the recruiting," he says, "but if your journals had not at it into today's headlines, the appeals of Mr. Asquith, and Lord Kitchener have failed, please get out of their heads as quickly as possible. All appeals have been answered, and more than answered. We have now considerably over two million men engaged in war or training for war, exclusive of the armies from overseas, and we shall get more, as quickly as we can train them and equip them."

"Some zealous recruiters have had the notion that the men would hold back if it were thought that the Government were getting enough without them, so they have poured ashes of their heads and uttered loud lamentations about the degeneracy of young Englishmen. Others, again, had committed themselves to the idea that voluntary enlistment must break down under the strain and have publicly proclaimed what they thought must be true without troubling to ascertain the facts."

"The result has been a most mischievous misapprehension, first in Germany, then among the Allies, and finally in the neutral nations, especially the United States. For how could we expect the sympathy of the volunteers if we were not alive to our own peril and could not be induced to make the effort necessary to win this war?"

"The truth is simply that no country has ever in a few months collected so large a force as we have since last August, or obtained a better class of recruits. From all I hear, they shape admirably, and promise to be a great new factor in the war. So do not be in the least alarmed when you hear people crabbing the old country. Its
