It is a huge pickle jar made of woo or cement with a conical roof. In December he opens the door and discovers that he has manufactured a food that the cattle would cry for if they needed to. The product is called ensilage. It is rapidly becoming the most popular sort of upholstery for the cattle on ten thousand American hills. A cow who holds a meal ticket at a silo can usual-
