UNACCEPTABLE.

VILLA GOT HIM INSTEAD.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Dec. 16. Captain de Fria, a young sportsman known in New York and New Orleans, and who with a companion, said to have left New York recently with the intention of killing a man, was shot by a man named Villa, and thereby winning fifty thousand dollars offered by the Government of Chihuahua State, was executed by the rebel leader, according to newspaper despatches from San Antonio from Juarez.

BIG FIRE LOSS.

HOBOKEN, N.J., Dec. 16. Explosions of souvenir shells brought from France, contributed yesterday to the destruction by fire of the Admiral Bessons Club House service men, also the First Reformed Church here. Nearby apartment houses were damaged. The loss was estimated at \$250,000.

MONTREAL, Dec. 16. Ada Wingard, an actress, who played one of the leading parts in "Experience" at His Majesty's Theatre, was awarded \$3,000 damages for breach of promise of marriage, by judgment of the Superior Court rendered yesterday afternoon by Mr. Justice MacLennan, against T. H. Wingard.

KILLED IN STREET CAR SMASH.

CALGARY, Alta., Dec. 16. A. D. Williams, letter carrier N. 2, was instantly killed, and twelve others more or less seriously injured, this morning, when South Calgary car No. 68, ran away down the street, crossing the tracks of the Calgary Streetcar, Westhill, and crashed into Crook's Drug Store at the intersection of the two streets. Both car and store were completely wrecked.

DELEGATION PERSONNEL.

PARIS, Dec. 16. A new German Delegation, which came to Paris to discuss compensation for the sinking of German warships in Scapa Flow, arrived this morning. The Delegation, which is headed over by Councillor Seelinger, a member of the Commercial Department of the German Foreign Ministry, consists of Rudolph Boehm, representative of Hamburg shipyards, Councillor Rich, of the Ministry of Public Works, Dr. Petzold, Director of the Hamburg American Line, Dr. Petenz, Director of Weser-shipyards at Bremen, a representative of the Hamburg Government and Paul Muller, representing three groups of seamen.

Workingmen's Party Committee Meets.

The working committee of the Workingmen's Political Party met last evening in the L. S. P. U. Hall, when the three late candidates, Messrs. Linagar, Cadwell and Foley submitted offers from both present Government and present Opposition for support in the coming bye-election in St. John's West. Hon. R. A. Squires was prepared to give many concessions as possible, while Sir M. P. Cashin, Leader of the Opposition, would adopt the Workingmen's Party Constitution, substituting it for his own, and take one Labor man as a candidate in the bye-election. Both offers were discussed by the committee—of which about 50 were present—and it was decided that a sub-committee be formed and delegated to interview Sir Michael and ask that he take two Workingmen's Candidates instead of one. The three candidates, Mr. Jas. J. McGrath, the Committee's Chairman, and Mr. Myler, were appointed on this committee and they met Sir M. P. Cashin this evening to lay before him the committee's decision. In the eventuality of the Opposition Leader granting the request he will have to finance the two Workingmen's Candidates, who would remain the Labor Candidates, with independence in the Assembly to take any stand they wished to.

Your "Mild" Cigar.

Storm van Leeuwen, of Utrecht, has prepared another surprise for the unsuspecting smoker, says the Journal of the American Medical Association. He has made an investigation of the actual nicotine content of cigar smoke collected under conditions comparable to those that prevail in the actual performance of smoking, in which some of the products of combustion are absorbed and only a part is collected in the mouth.

According to the observations made by the Dutch pharmacologist, no correlation between the supposed "strength" of cigars and the toxicity of their vapors could be established.

If this be correct, it follows that the current designation of tobacco as "mild" or otherwise, probably depends in large measure on factors of flavor or aroma as well as on assumed physiologic effects that it may bring about. What constituents are responsible has not been determined.

Ship Wrecked by Lightning.

The fate of Airship N.S. 11, also of the schooner Meridian, which were both struck by lightning, set on fire and destroyed, is a very rare one.

Practically all vessels are provided with lightning conductors in one form or another, and while there is never a day in the year in which ships are not sailing or steaming through thunderstorms, there are very few records indeed of vessels being struck or—even if struck—of serious damage being done.

Still, the end of both airship and sea-ship is a proof that such things do occur, and there have been several similar cases in the past.

The British ship Moses bound from Smyrna to Queenstown ran into a furious storm off Malta. Towards midnight lightning struck the main mast and flashed down it into the hold. Whether there was some explosion or not no one knows, but the whole ship broke in two and sank in three minutes. The only survivor was her skipper, Captain Pearson, who was picked up seventeen hours after, clinging to some wreckage.

Early in the nineteenth century the British warship Royal Charlotte, lying in the River Hought, below Calcutta, was struck. Her powder magazine was fired by the flash and she blew up with a shock felt for miles around.

About the same date the King George from Bombay was sailing up the river at Canton when a flash of lightning struck the main mast and leaped from that into the hold killing seven men. Some hours later it was discovered that the whole ship was afloat, and she was burned to the water's edge.

Highballs Grow on Trees.

Alcohol in these days has attention from governments in diverse ways. England has had a committee studying the possibilities of increasing the production of alcohol to be used in generating power.

The opportunities discussed by the committee are interesting, says the Nation's Business. Of course, potatoes, artichokes and cereals came in for attention. But it seems there are less known sources of alcohol. For example there is the flower of the maphia tree, which flourishes in Hyderabad and the central part of India. This flower, when sun-dried, contains 60 per cent. of its weight in fermentable sugar, and apparently is to be gathered by the ton. Then there are the fertile gases of the coke ovens. They are so rich in surprises to the everyday man that it is not very startling to learn they contain ethylene, which by synthetic processes somewhat developed under the stress of war may be converted into ethyl alcohol.

With the coal beds about to produce alcohol, and the trees of India fairly blossoming with it, the man with a motor car may quiet the fears aroused by the scientists' figures which show that we are within sight of the end of petroleum and gasoline. There is nothing like being easy in one's mind.
