That Abattoir.

OPEN LETTER FROM THE EAST END PEOPLE.

To the Municipal Council.
Your Honour and Gentlemen.—From the account of the proceedings at your last meeting we learn that the subject of the proposed erection of an "Abattoir" in the East End of the City was again discussed, and the matter deferred until a Report was received from the Medical Health Officer.

We beg to remind you that some time ago we laid before you a petition, largely signed and voicing the opinion of all the residents and property owners in the East End, strongly protesting against the erection of an "Abattoir" or "Slaughter House" on the proposed site on Water Street, immediately west of the Standard Manufacturing Company, or anywhere within the city limits.

Our burden of smoke and smells and dust is already very heavy, and we pray that you will not add to it by planting in our midst a Slaughter House, for call it an Abattoir or by any other name, it is a slaughter house pure and simple, where all the killing of animals for food purposes will be carried out, with the attendant sickening odours, myriads of flies and swarms of rats, whilst the idea of having a slaughter house in our midst is to us very objectionable.

The promoters of the Abattoir scheme have, no doubt, presented for your approval plans and specifications which look and read all right, but things do not always turn out according to plan, and please remember, Gentlemen, that if you permit this building, costing a large sum of erected, no matter how great a nuisance it proves to be, it cannot be removed and we will have no redress. You are probably aware that of late we have been endeavouring to make this end of the city a better place to live in than formerly. Some of the old unsightly buildings have been torn down, and in their stead we have erected a new Church and laid out the grounds around it; also a new School and Hall that compare favourably with any buildings of the kind in the city, and we had visions of our children reaping the benefit in years to come, but our time and money will have been expended for naught if you permit abattoirs and such like to be erected in our midst.

With miles of land lying idle outside, we fail to understand why this building must be built within the city limits; no other slaughter house is allowed there, and we anticipate that the Medical Health Officer will remind you of this fact.

As residents and taxpayers of the East End of the city, we have, in our petition before you, and have placed ourselves on record as being strongly opposed to the building of any slaughter house within the city limits. We are desirous of seeing conditions bettered, and submit that the building of the abattoir on the proposed site would be a step in the wrong direction.

Valuable Property Destroyed.

On Saturday the dwelling house, stable and fox farm of Mr. John Guiney, Freshwater, Ferryland district, near Cappahayden, were totally destroyed by a forest fire raging at the time, and being some little distance from that settlement, the burnt premises were cut off by the flames and no assistance could be rendered by the nearest neighbor. The flames also threatened Cappahayden and people there did not know the moment that it would be swept, but luckily a change of wind averted what would otherwise have been a tragedy. The loss to the Guiney family is very severe as we understand that no insurance was carried on the property. No other particulars are available at the time of writing, but it is said that almost all the live stock about the farm was destroyed. Mr. Guiney and his family have the sympathy of all the residents of the section.

Forest Fires.

On Wednesday last dense smoke descended from a fire in the woods to the west, the wind from that direction blowing the mass to us. The fire was in the westward of Shearstown, and the smoke was so great that a considerable blaze must have been on and the area burnt over extensive. The fire must have been a fire made by some one in the woods for some purpose. It is not unlikely that trouble was made a fire and by neglect allowed it to run. The law about making a fire in the woods is very stringent, but there is evidence that the conditions are more observed in the bush than in the burnt places year after year. There is quite a lot of

green woods to the westward of Shearstown south of the old railway line and east of the track, woods that is valuable to the people supplying them with timber for the many purposes for which timber is required.

If there are any fire-wardens in this or in Port de Grave District they should do something in the way of protecting the small areas of woods that is left. The railway, years ago, was responsible for a great part of the fires which then swept over the land contiguous to the line, but the present fire cannot be charged up to that cause. There is gross carelessness shown by men making fires in our woods, carelessness that causes damage which in time will leave nothing but bleached rocks to mark the tracts where good timber grew. The law respecting the making of fires in the woods should be published to show how and where fires can be made.—Mr. Grace Standard.
