Gold Mining on the Labrador.

As there is likely to be a considerable rush of miners to the Labrador this summer, we think it worth while to draw attention to the fact that the part of Labrador (Le-bras-d'or) where the prospective mining will be, belongs to the Dominion of Newfoundland, and is not a part of Canada in any shape or way, and as such, is subject to all the laws, regulations, and Customs Tariffs of that Colony, which is self-governing and entirely separate from the Dominion of Canada. We think this should be widely known, because those who are making arrangements to take their supplies from either Canada or the States will have to pay the high Customs duties of at least 50 per cent on the cost of the goods on their arrival on the Labrador Coast. It is not generally known that St. John's Newfoundland, is a large city with up-to-date modern stores, severally turning over millions of dollars annually; where steamers and ocean going vessels are fitted out, and where suitable vessels, with and without power, and mining supplies of every description can be had at competitive prices which are not subject to any duty whatever on the Labrador—which would effect a considerable saving to the miner. In St. John's also first-hand information can be had as to the waters, coast, and suitability of supplies, from men who have made their living on the Labrador for years. To most men the Labrador is an unknown quantity, but Newfoundlanders have carried on a big trade and fishery there for the past hundred years, and what is known about that country, is known in Newfoundland.—F. H. Knowling, St. John's, Nfld.—Montreal Star.
